Statehouse Gossip

Governor Martin this month was taking it easy. The fore part of the current week he was visiting in Washington. He will attend the Legion convention at The Dalles this week and later will tour the state with the members of the state highway commission. This is vacation month at the state capitol.

Harry Corbett, president of the senate, who at the present writing is acting governor of Oregon, is perhaps the only one of that class who has not come to Salem to sit in the executive chair. He has been governor on several previous occasions, but he has not been at the capitol, performing the necessary routine functions at his offices in Portland.

The city of Woodburn is out after the permanent site of the state championship game for the American Legion Junior Baseball league, which just completed its annual contests Sunday. Woodburn is ideally situated for the contests, has a fine baseball diamond, and its citizens are enthusiastic for the contests. The recent games were well attended.

The state of Oregon has taken on a new drive to curb automobile accidents. One drastic move was the complete elimination of the United Stages Systems from use of the Oregon highways with the exception of a short stretch from Portland to the Washington line. The chief reason was the excessive speed which this line used in traveling over the highways.

The company, a subsidiary of the Greyhound Stages, placed into service to meet the competition of cheaper bus lines, violated virtually every motor vehicle law and regulations of the utilities commissioner, the order cancelling the intra and inter-state permits becomes effective at midnight Friday, August 16.

A detailed review shows that most accidents occur between two vehicles, but that most people are killed by non-collision accidents, in the upstate districts, while in Portland pedestrians are the majority of victims. Three times as many men are killed as women. Men drivers are mostly involved due largely to the greater proportion of male drivers.

The age of drivers involved in accidents in the upstate report for June shows them between 25 and 40 years, and strange as it may seem, drivers with six years or more experience have the most accidents. The normal drivers likewise have the most accidents while the next high list are those who have been drinking.

Other interesting facts reveal that drivers failing to give the right of

way are responsible for most of the accidents while those not stopping at arterial highways or using caution at crossroads contribute the next high accident records.

Pedestrians crossing intersections where there are no signals constitute the largest number of this type of victims, while the condition of most pedestrians involved show they had also been drinking. Automobiles in apparently good condition, and not those with defects, were listed as involved in most accidents.

Most accidents occur between the hours of four and six p. m., while fatalities resulting from accidents have occurred between the hours of midnight and 3 a. m. Saturday is the heaviest day for accidents, followed closely by Sunday. Most accidents occur on clear days, and at street intersections. Dry roads also leads the list.

A review of these statistics reveals the need for more careful driving at a time and under conditions which appear ideal. The revelation concludes in the statement that where there are defects to watch, the drivers are more careful. Both the state police organizations and the secretary of state's office are working on solutions for increasing number of accidents on Oregon's highways.

The state highway engineering staff complained this week that the more money the federal government pours into Oregon for highways the more dissatisfied people become. In other words they are much harder to please. Allocation of federal funds must be made largely on the basis of unemployment, which gives engineers a headache.

Many upstate counties, particularly in the sparsely settled sections have registered complaints because much of the work has been allocated in the vicinity of Portland. But what could be done? Portland has about 49 per cent of the unemployment, while some eastern counties have either none or very few.

Delay has again been noted in getting the \$9,200,000 highway work for the state the next 18 months under way. The allocations have been made and specifications are being prepared for lettings at the rate of about a million dollars a month, but the federal bureau has not yet approved the first letting. It appears as though it will be October before the first work finally gets under way. The initial letting has been put over one

week from the time set following receipt of final regulations. Winter work will present another problem for the commission, which means perhaps work in the coast counties only.

Bean pickers in the state of Oregon are given a protection as well as the producers, Charles H. Gram, state labor commissioner, advised. The minimum wage law for pickers is 83 cents a hundred pounds. The producers, however, may with hold 10 cents a hundred until the end of the season to guarantee a crew near the end of the season. At that time he

must pay the amount held back. However if the worker should quit, he forfeits the 10 cents per, while should he be fired by the producer he will be paid the full amount.


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
