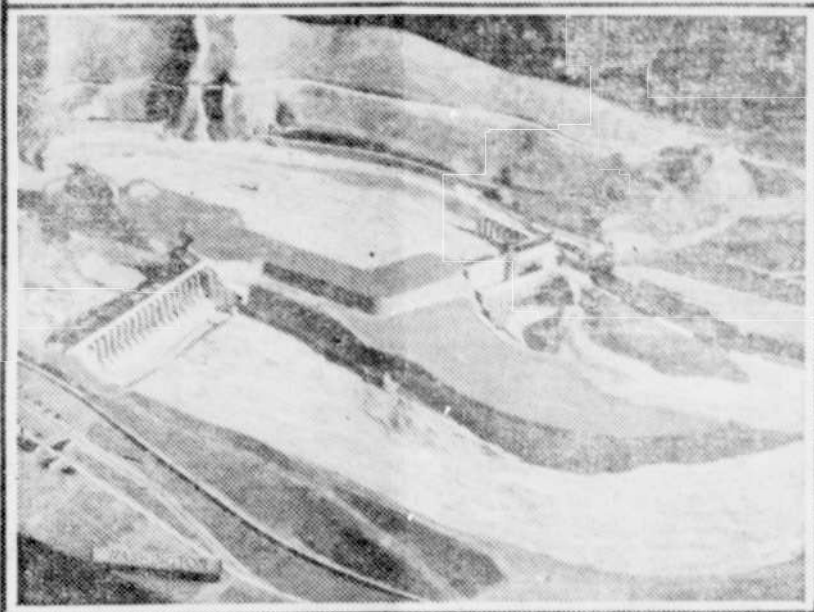
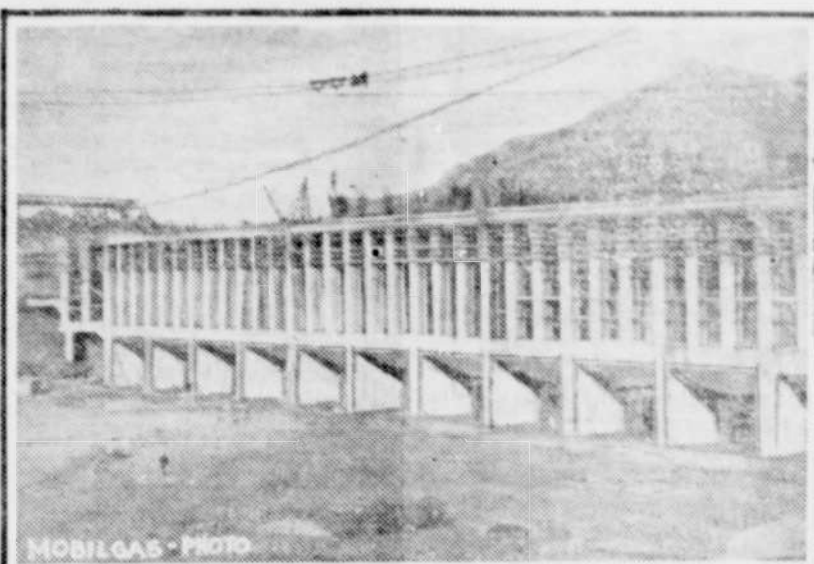

Bonneville Work Progresses



The huge Bonneville dam is rapidly taking form, as shown by the top picture of the sub-structure of the power house, obtained recently by the Mobilgas-Wood. In the background is one of the mountains of the Cascade range on the Oregon side of the Columbia. Below is a picture of a model of the dam as it will appear when completed. The upper shore is Oregon and the lower shore Washington with Bradford Island in the center. On the left is the spillway and on the right of the island is the power house with the navigation locks just to its right. The re-located railroad (lower) and highway (upper) may be seen on the hills on the Oregon side.

Visitors are admitted to the project on Sundays only, although a good view of the work may be obtained from the shores of the river at any time, according to the General Petroleum reporter. The dam is about 41 miles east of Portland.

Tramps Out Reed Canary Seed

ALBANY—When Paul Ohling, Linn
county farmer, was ready this year to
harvest a seed crop from the half acre
of Reed canary grass that he has
had growing for the past year or two
on some of his low, swampy ground,
he became impatient with the usual
slow method of picking the individual
heads by hand, so he cut it with his
binder, as he would grain or rye grass.
Then came the problem of threshing
it, which with this crop is also a slow
difficult process using average farm
equipment. So Mr. Ohling used his
imagination. He spread the grass
over the barn floor and walked over it
each time he went to feed his stock.
He now has most of the seed tramped
out and lying about an inch deep on
the floor, according to County Agent
Floyd Mullen who inspected it recently.

Washington Snap Shots

Adjournment of Congress is now
definitely in the air. Some time the
latter part of August tired legislators
will turn their faces homeward—in
many cases to face critical constitu-
ents whose views upon things political
reputedly have changed since Con-
gressmen left home for Washington.

The banking bill giving the Federal
Government greater power over credit
was the last major piece of legisla-
tion sought by the Administration, ex-
cept the tax bill. When this bill slid
through without much debate, the end
of the long session definitely was in
sight. Although the Government was
careful never to indicate how much it
wanted the bank bill, it was actually
one of the key bills of the entire ses-
sion, and Senator Glass upset one of
the prize New Deal apple carts when
he curtailed the powers sought under
the bill.

With this bill the Government
sought to prevent the banks from ex-
ercising their own judgment about the
worth of Government securities. In
other words, it could compel the
banks to buy U. S. notes. But the
Government did not want the impres-
sion to get out that the time might
come when it would be unable to bor-
row new billions without compulsion.

Another bill which lingered into the
final days, although passed by both
houses early in July, was the utility
bill. With wide differences be-
tween the House and Senate bills, con-
ferences of the two branches set to work
to iron out the differences. But when
they met the first time, in pooped
little Ben Cohen, one of the young
lawyers, who helped write the bill to
be handed to Congress for enactment,
and who helped lobby it through Con-
gress. He insisted upon sitting into
the private sessions of the Committee.
A majority of the House conferees re-
fused to sit with him in sessions, and
the bill was shelved for weeks. It was
probably the most flagrant case of the
executive department of the Govern-
ment trying to influence the legisla-
tive branch.

Reports are seeping around Wash-
ington that Cabinet changes will be
made before next year. A number of
changes have come recently in the
secondary jobs. Postmaster General
Farley is slated to resign to conduct
the Roosevelt campaign for re-elec-
tion. One rumor is that Claude Bowers,
former editorial writer and key-
note at the 1928 Democratic national
convention, will be brought into the
cabinet so that his ringing oratory can
be utilized next year.

On a basis of present prospects,
speakers will be much in demand next
year. Six months ago the Adminis-

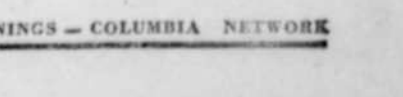
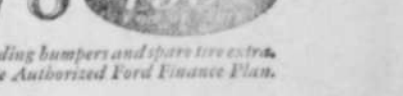
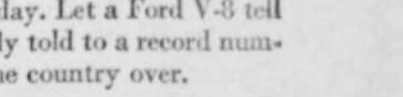
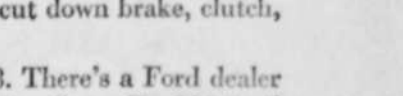
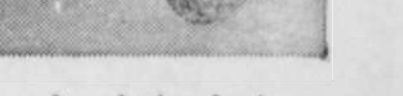
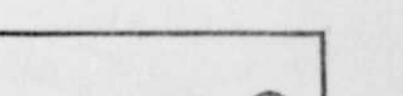
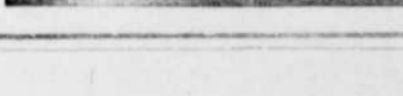
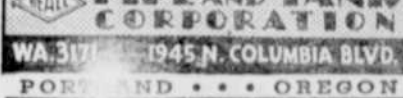
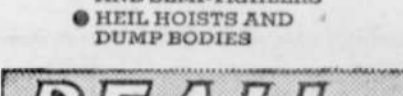
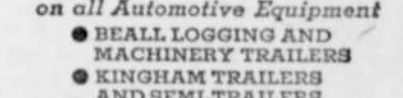
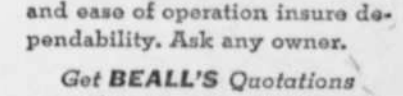
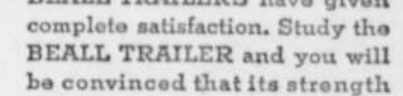
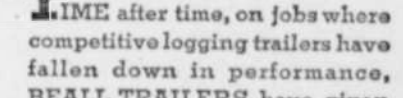
tration's political sagas did not see the
necessity of much campaigning. The
present Congress and recent political
blunders by the Administration have
brought such a deluge of criticism
and such an obvious revolt in many
parts of the country that a full-
throated campaign is now in prospect.

The difficulty from the Democratic
viewpoint is, however, that most of
statements of the party have turned
their backs on it. John W. Davis, for-
mer Senator James A. Reed, Missuri
Sen. Carter Glass, Alfred E. Smith and
others cannot be counted upon for
general support. On the contrary,
there is a fear that they may go to
the country with a demand for a re-
turn to Constitutional government.
The Administration cannot send Tug-
well, Cohen, Corcoran, Professor
Frankfurter and the other advisors to
the President out on the stump. None
of the Cabinet, except possibly Tokes,
are strong campaigners. So new
blood is reported being sought.

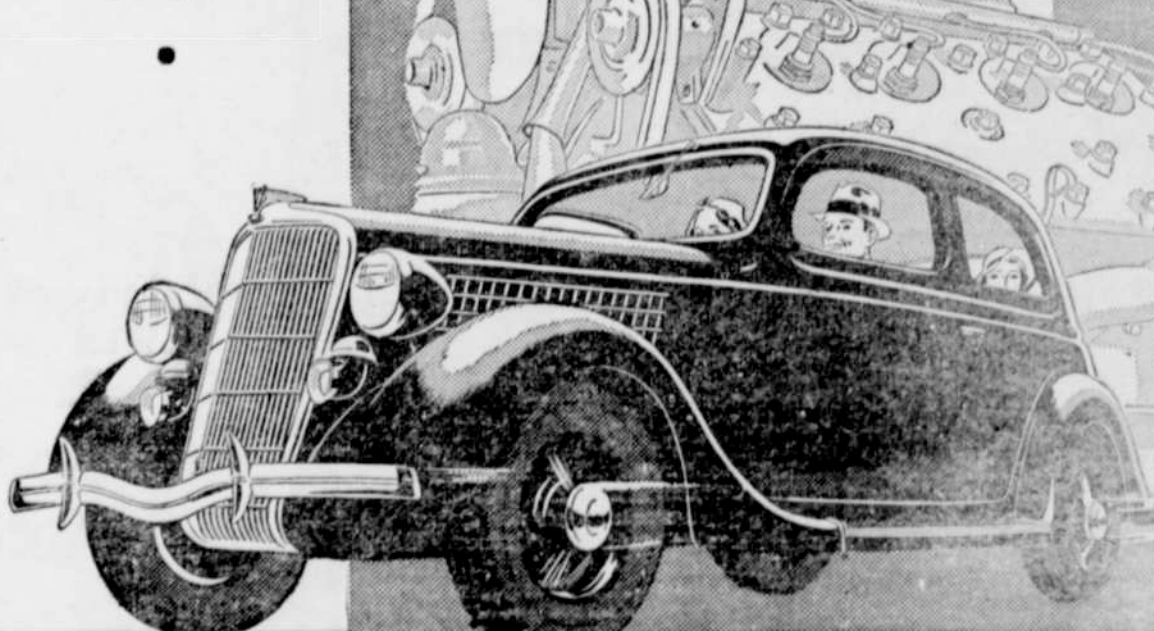
