Prizes are as follows: In the beef cattle division, \$6,500.00 which includes \$1,500.00 from American Hereford association; \$1,200.00 from the American Shorthorn association and \$380.00 from Aberdeen Angus association. Dairy Division \$6,550.00, which includes \$250.00 from the American Brown Swiss association. Sheep and Goat division, \$5,674.00 which includes, added money from sheep breed associations as follows: Ramboulets \$100; Shropshires, \$300; Hampshires, \$382; Oxford \$10; Dorsets, \$20; Romneys, \$50; Cotswolds \$25; and Lincoln, \$50; Swine division, six breeds \$2,250. Heavy Draft Horse division \$3,600. Fat stock division \$4,000 including added money from American Shorthorn, American Hereford and Aber-

deen-Angus association. Boys and Girls 4-H club division about \$5,000 which includes Portland Union Stock Yards Specials for Pig Feeding and Corn Growing Contest of \$1,500 and added money from Herefords and Aberdeen-Angus and Shorthorn, Hampshire Sheep, Shropshires and Caeviots, National associations and many offerings of pure-bred livestock by prominent breeders.

Payrolls Rise in Steel Industry above Last Year

Washington—Payrolls in the steel industry rose nearly \$8,000,000 or 22 per cent during July of this year as compared with the same month of last year when NRA was in operation. The payrolls in the industry in July totaled \$42,725,150 as against \$34,913,521 a year ago.

Klamath Seed Harvest Large

KLAMATH FALLS—The total harvest of small seeds in Klamath county this year will be approximately 750,000 pounds, or the largest amount in the history of the district, according to County Agent C. A. Henderson. It will include about a quarter million pounds of alsike clover seed, a similar

amount of seed peas, about 60,000 lbs. of bluegrass seed, some sweet and red clover, and miscellaneous other grasses. The bent grass harvest is under way and indications are that yields will be good and quality excellent, says Mr. Henderson.

Southern Senator Opposes Centralization of Power

Washington—(IPS)—Senator Ellison D. Smith, a South Carolina Democrat, definitely placed himself on record as opposing centralization of further power in Washington in an address to war veterans of his state. Urging preservation of the principle of State's Rights, he warned against encroachment by those who sought a more powerful government through revision of the Constitution.

"The Constitution of the United States," the Southern statesman said, "creates the three departments—executive, legislative, and judicial, with checks and balances contained therein, and constitutes the fundamental principles of the dual form of the American government.

"No part of the triangle shall be removed!

"The invitation to repeal or to modify the tenth amendment in order to transfer to, or invest in, the Congress of the United States power to pass laws regulating all the internal concerns of the several states, or to regulate the "social and economic problems of the states," as it is flippantly phrased by some whose mental ligaments must have become temporarily twisted, is a proposal so astounding as to justify the righteous indignation and stern opposition of thoughtful Americans.

"Powers of the federal government under the Constitution are limited and were so intended. The powers not delegated to the United States, nor prohibited to the states, are preserved to the states respectively, or to the people. As long as I am Senator, I shall continue to oppose all bills that attempt to encroach upon the sovereign rights of South Carolina."
