St. Mary's of the Valley offers four years of high school work, as well as the elementary grades. The academic department offers college preparatory and commercial courses, and art and music. The school is accredited by the state.

A very successful year of activity is anticipated. This year's enrollment notes a growth in the student body, an increase in the members of the faculty and registration in the various departments much larger than during the past few years.

The sports engaged in are principally basketball, tennis, and indoor baseball. There are facilities for these sports in the spacious gymnasium and the double tennis courts adjoining it as well as the extensive grounds which surround the main building. All students have opportunities for participation in these activities. Added interest is given by inter-school contests. All study is under supervision. A student is given individual attention to insure her keeping up with her classes.
