The American System Undermined by New Deal

By Nicolas Roosevelt For the National Republican Builders, Inc.

When Senator Carter Glass, Lewis
Douglas, Herbert Hoover and the Su-
preme Court of the United States are
all in accord that the New Deal is
trying to effect drastic changes in
the American form of government,
it is futile to pretend that this is not
so.

It is therefore pertinent to inquire
what these changes are and whether
they are desirable—let alone whether
they are constitutional. What should
the Republican policy be with re-
spect to them?

Underlying most of the New Deal
acts is the theory of a paternalistic
central government.

Under this theory power is to be
concentrated in the hands of the
President at the expense not only of
the States but of Congress. In so far
as the Supreme Court can nullify
this process many New Dealers wish
to see the Courts right to interpret
the Constitution curtailed.

In short, New Dealers are seeking
to discard the carefully developed
system of checks and balances which
is the product of 150 years of Ameri-
can political experience based on cen-
turies of Anglo-Saxon background.
They want a strongly centralized gov-
ernment in place of the loosely knit
Federal system which we have de-
veloped.

Why not make such a change?
say many people in good faith. New
economic and social conditions, they
tell us, demand new political meth-
ods.

The answer is, in the first place,
that the mere assertion of the pre-
mise that new conditions demand new
political machinery does not neces-
sarily mean that our pre-1932 political
system is outmoded. Even were it
to be proved that new machinery is
needed it is essential to examine
what the New Deal's program offers
in place of what we had and then to
see what we would have to give up in
exchange for the supposed benefits
of the new system.

If a paternalistic government is to
be established in the United States
the American people will be expected
to give back to the sovereign who
for the moment happens to be a well-
meaning President) those rights of
the individual which were so hard
won from kings and rulers of old.

If the principles underlying the
New Deal are carried to their inevi-
table conclusion the sovereign will
have the right of planning for the
economic activities of the whole na-
tion. This means that individuals
and corporations will have to take
orders from Washington as to how
they may engage in farming, manu-
facture, commerce and transportation.
It means, in short, the re-estab-
lishment of an all-powerful and po-
tentially arbitrary government of the
very sort against which generations
of Americans and northern Europeans
rebelled and from which the
Americans at last won independence.

"Why not?" is the insidious com-
ment of the New Dealers. "The
country is so tightly knit together
that a strongly centralized govern-
ment is indispensable."

The answer to this is doubly "No."
The size of the population alone
makes centralization impractical and
undesirable.

Furthermore, the recent history of
Europe clearly shows that the road
of dictatorship leads to disaster.

If followed in this country the
American people will no longer be
citizens but subjects. The govern-
ment will not exist for them but they
for the government. They will sur-
render a large measure of their po-
litical freedom.

This is not progress, but reaction of
the most dangerous sort.

The fact that these dangers are
inherent in the New Deal does not
mean that the constitution cannot
and should not be amended. It was
last amended only two years ago.
But it does mean that before em-
barking on a new amendment it is
well to bear in mind Franklin D.
Roosevelt's own description of that
document as "the most marvelously
elastic compilation of the rules of
government ever written," and then

ask specifically just what the amend-
ment should be.

For the Republicans this implies
that they must turn their faces re-
solutely against New Deal sniping at
the American form of government.
It does not follow that they must op-
pose any and all amendments to the
constitution. But they must—and
will—oppose any amendment which
would, in effect, weaken the present
balance of power between the three
branches of the Federal government
and between the Federal and the
State governments.

There is particular danger, for ex-
ample, in the loosely worded amend-
ment which Representative Keller
has proposed, to the effect that "The
Congress shall have power to make
all laws which in its judgment shall
be necessary to provide for the gen-
eral welfare of the people."

Under these carefree and innocent
words lurks the power to destroy the
whole framework of the American
form of government.

Congress might, under this amend-
ment, surrender to the President vir-
tually all of its powers and create a
dictatorship within the framework of
the Constitution. It was much in this
manner that Caesar Augustus effect-
ed the final transformation of the
Roman Republic into an Empire.

Why make it easy today for some
possible future adventurer or self-
seeker in the White House to wreck
this last stronghold of Democratic
government in the world? Germany
has its Hitler and Italy its Mussolini.
Is America immune from this mad-
ness?

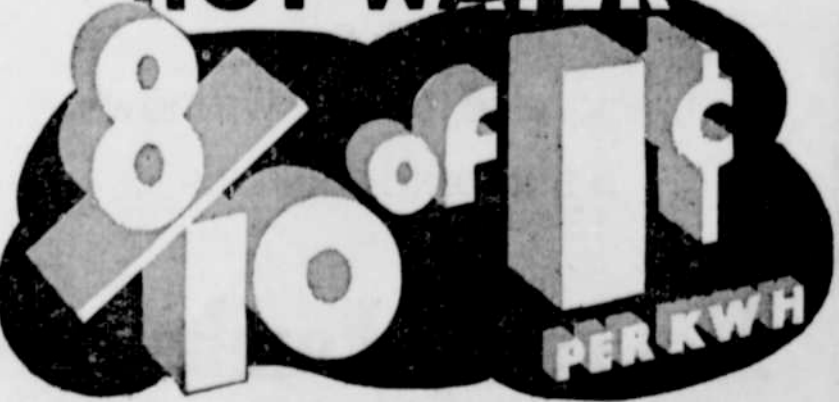
