## You Don't Have to Know Anything

It doesn't take brains to push the throttle of your car to the floorboard. It doesn't take cleverness to weave in and out of traffic at sixty miles an hour to the consternation of the slower moving highway-users.

It doesn't take any intellectual capacity to hang onto the steering wheel, give her the gun, and see if you can make the speedometer touch ninety-odd.

In other words, you don't have to know anything to drive fast.

Drivers who regard streets and highways as the Indianapolis bowl, might be divided into two classes: First, those who are weary of living and don't mind if they take innocent parties along with them into eternity. Second, those who are so stupid as to not realize that several thousand pounds of metal moving at terrific speeds is as lethal a weapon as a machine gun—both for the occupants and for anyone else who happens to be in the locality.

Speed—and speed alone—is responsible for the great majority of automobile accidents. All other causes pale into significance beside it. As even the most mentally deficient driver should be able to realize, an accident occurring at sixty miles per hour is almost invariably more serious than one occurring at 20.

The roads of America are strewn with corpses because a relatively small number of drivers are doing their best to emulate Malcolm Campbell.

## Farm Relief that Means Something

There seems to be no end to the various schemes proposed for "farm relief."

Friends of the AAA claim it is the perfect medicine. Those who believed in the departed Federal Farm Board regret that it has gone. A legion of others put in periodic appearances with farm relief ideas that are new and novel.

It is true that government should do all it can, within the realm of practicality and sound-economics, for agriculture. It is also true that government has achieved the best result when it has helped farmers to help selves, rather than simply doing out money for nothing.

Government, for instance, has aided in the development of farm cooperatives, and fine things have been done. These cooperatives, most of which are now solid on their financial feet, are bringing the farmer many benefits. They show him how to better his crops—how to operate more efficiently—how to balance supply and demand—how to get a fairer share of the final selling price of his products. They are putting millions in the farmers' pocket—millions that are honestly and intelligently earned.

That's the kind of "farm relief" that means something.

Let a new concrete highway leading into town be opened and every businessman in the community will easily visualize the avenue which it opens for new customers to reach the town.

But experts who have looked into such things agree that the pages of the home newspaper are a highly important factor in determining where trade goes. Where the paper goes, merchandise goes. Concrete highways may make trading easier, but

## Forward-Looking Policies

At the recent annual convention of the Food and Grocery Chain Stores of America, resolutions in opposition to selling below cost and in opposition to sectional price cutting designed to suppress competitors, were adopted. Another resolution urged members of the organization to maintain good wages and reasonable working hours for employees and said, "We believe that one of the most valuable assets any industry can have is happy, well paid and contented employees."

These are forward-looking policies, definitely in the public interest, that deserve the emulation of all industries.

## Patronage Money Fails

Patronage money failed to provide New York's state assembly with a democratic majority at the election Tuesday. When the final count was revealed the Republicans had 82 of the 150 members or a lead of 14. Philadelphia voters elected a Republican Mayor by a 40,000 majority and Cleveland a Republican mayor.

These three elections show that the American public is gradually regaining its dignity, by refusing to be bought off.

## Election Petitions Under Circulation

While Oregon voters will not be called upon to ballot at an election this November, sponsors of initiative petitions are already working for measures that will be up for consideration at the polls a year from now.

Eight preliminary petitions have been filed with the secretary of state, and ballot titles have been prepared by the attorney-general on six of the proposed measures. In addition a constitutional amendment affecting compensation of legislative members and a bill changing the primary elections to September, both submitted to vote of the people by the 1935 legislative assembly, and a referendum ordered by petition on a measure enacted by the legislature providing for the levying and collecting of student fees at the institutions of higher learning, will appear on the ballots at the general election in 1936.

The initiative measures for which ballot titles have been completed are: Annual elections without nominations and compulsory recall constitutional amendment; amendment forbidding prevention or regulation of certain advertising if truthful; bill regulating the sale and dealing in motor fuel; bill permitting limited Rogue River commercial fishing and repealing prohibitive law; old age and disability pension bill; and homestead tax exemption and additional income tax amendment.

Two measures for which ballot titles have not been completed are the state banking bill and the grange power bill. Whether or not any of the initiative measures will appear on the ballot at the general election will depend on the success of petition circulators in obtaining the required number of signatures to insure the submission of the bills and amendments to the people.

Mr. Creitz is well known as the founder and director of the large Turn Verein orchestra of Portland. He was three years head of the violin department and director of orchestra at O. S. C. and earlier held the same position at Pacific for eight years. He will continue with his Portland studio. ## Washington Snapshots by JAMES PRESTON

With the return of President Roosevelt to Washington from his vacation trip it is unlikely that there will be any let up on political news from now until after the elections exactly a year away. And unless some new element is injected which might completely change the political picture (such as a European war) America is in for one of its most hard-fought campaigns in many years.

What are the issues? Who will be the nominees? Those are the questions which will begin to find their answers as President Roosevelt unfolds his program for the next Congress, and as the Supreme Court passes upon certain New Deal laws which will reach the highest tribunal during the winter. Taking the second question first—the nominees—it is generally accepted that President Roosevelt will be re-nominated despite the opposition that has sprung up within the Democratic party. On the Republican side of the field is still more or less wide open, with the only certainty that the nominee will come from the Middle West.

Actually the issues are more interesting for political discussion at this time and are giving political Washington more concern. It is impossible to get down into the one big issue which always stirs any campaign, but in the following four can be forecast the battle lines.  
1. Amendment or circumvention of the Constitution, including the shearing of power from the Supreme Court.  
2. The cost of government and the tremendous relief expenditures.  
3. Taxation, reaching down to the wage earner and small home owner.  
4. The rising cost of living due to the philosophy of scarcity.

opinion made by the American Institute of Public Opinion showed that three voters out of every five believe Government spending is too much. Private polls of public opinion have shown clearly that the grass root voters are beginning to realize that the billion dollar expenditures must be paid eventually by every person in the land with income and that even the farmers who get the checks are starting to worry over paying the bill.

Despite denials on the part of Geo. L. Berry, the President's recently appointed coordinator for industrial cooperation, that he has no plans for revising the NRA, Washington observers have been at a loss to know what his intentions are in inviting representatives of consumers, labor and industry to mid-November conferences if not to build a framework for a new NRA under a new name.

President Roosevelt, on August 24, wrote a letter to Congress urging committee hearings in the fall looking to new industrial legislation. It is a significant fact that the President's letter was inclosed in the Berry invitation to business men to attend Washington conferences. The question naturally arose: If not to fulfill the President's suggestion, then for what purpose were the conferences to be held? Editors generally accepted these facts at face value.

The nearest to truth is that the famous Washington "trial balloon" stunt, accompanied by a new burst of propaganda is to be tried. Few observers deny that sentiment over the country is thoroughly against anything smacking of a new NRA, but officials are expected to try to test public opinion to see how far they can go with new regulations with an election just a few months away.
