Washington Snapshots by JAMES PRESTON

The handwriters in Washington are
busy scribbling political omens on the
wall these days. In a few weeks the
legislative halls will be filled with
Senators and Representatives, conven-
ing for the second session of the 74th
Congress. What will they do? What
will they be asked to do? Will it
bring an end to the White House do-
mination, a trend which was noticeable
toward the close of the last session?

One of the answers probably will be
found as the case history unfolds on a
letter sent by the House Expendi-
tures committee to all executive de-
partments—a letter which has led to
the discovery that a resolution pledg-
ing economy in government was
adopted secretly before adjournment
of the last Congress. The letter to
department heads asked for definite
suggestion for cutting expenses and
promoting efficiency in the tangle of
agencies that has grown up around
Washington at such high cost.

For a Congressional Committee so
heavily laden with members the ma-
jority party to go over the Presi-
dent's head is almost unprecedented.
Coupled with statements of Chairman
Buchanan of the House Appropriations
Committee another Democrat that
the end of billion dollar blank
checks has come, the letter apparent-
ly had but one meaning. Members
of Congress have heard from home.
It is perhaps one of the best indica-
tions that the country has definitely
turned against loose spending and im-
pending higher taxes upon every per-
son who works.

One of the National Press club wags
points out in connection with the ap-
pointment of George L. Berry as co-
ordinator of industrial cooperation,
that the Supreme Court killed NRA,
and now Mr. Roosevelt has decided to
Berry it.

One of the most glittering achieve-
ments of Washington recently has
been the development of a statistical
method by which it can be proved
that the farmer is getting above par
for his products, but the consumer at
the same time is paying below par
for food. The Department of Labor
merely waved a magic wand, and
 presto—the retail price of food,
which had been above normal—with
loud cries from housewives—suddenly
fell below. In figuring normal retail
prices, the 1913 level was used as 100
and the index stood at 127. Now the
Department has decided to shift the
normal level to the 1923-25 average.
The change was suggested by the
American Statistical society, and the
industrial production level is figured
with 1925 as average. But the catch
is that the index of farm purchasing
power is 1909-14. In those years
farm products occupied a somewhat
more favorable position than in 1923-
25. So by using pre-war figures in
one case, and post-war in the other,
everyone is satisfied—if they believe
in figures.

The New York Times, however,
points out that "if consistency is the
Government's aim, it ought to make
a thorough job of it. It is absurd
to have farm prices measured by one
yardstick and retail food prices by
another."

Body Dies by Organs

The human body dies, not quite by
inches, but at least by organs, ac-
cording to a heart specialist. The
first organ to die after the heart stops
pumping blood around the body is
the brain. This happens in from eight
to ten minutes, so that stoppage of
the heart for about that long kills
the brain and makes the victim a com-
plete or partial idiot, even if the
heart later starts up again. Next to
die is the muscle of the heart itself,
which happens in from ten to twenty
minutes after the blood stops circu-
lating. This marks the time within
which victims of heart failure may be
revived. Hearts which have stopped
for more than twenty minutes are like-
ly themselves to be dead and impos-
sible to start.

A Turkey Dinner

The Thanksgiving Dinner calls for
turkey just as a leg of lamb calls for
mint sauce. And just as the mint
brings out and improves the flavor
of the meat, so must the meal built
around the turkey enhance the antici-
pated turkey flavor and not submerge
it. Tart sauces and salads or crisp
vegetable salads with French dressing
instead of a cooked vegetable are par-
ticularly pleasing accessories.

You will find cranberry sherbet a
delightful accompaniment to the meat
course. It would take the place of
the traditional cranberry sauce and
being a change will add zest and
sparkle to your meal. Also if you
have an automatic refrigerator, pur-
chase your sherbet early and keep in
freezing tray until you are ready to
serve.

Avoid too elaborate a dinner. You
owe it to your family to avoid fatigue
and irritability on Thanksgiving Day
especially.

In the suggested menu note that all
of the accessories to the turkey itself
can be prepared in advance—at least
the evening before.

Men show a decided preference for
pie as a Thanksgiving dessert. The
Pumpkin Chiffon Pie-Whipped Cream
is delicious; it has the added advan-
tage of being as light a dessert as you
can serve. And the fact that you put
the filling into a baked shell is in its
favor. There is no danger here of a
soggy lower crust and the shell can
be prepared a day or two in advance.

Pumpkin Chiffon Pie

Cook together in double boiler until

thickened 1 cup brown sugar; 3 eggs

yolks (beaten slightly); 1½ cup cooked

pumpkin; ½ cup milk; 2 tsp cinnam-

on; ½ tsp ginger; ¼ tsp allspice and

¼ tsp salt.

Then soak 2 tbsp gelatin in ¼ cup

cold water and add to the above mix-

ture. When it begins to cool fold in

the 3 egg whites beaten stiff and 2

tbsp of sugar. Put all into baked

shell and serve with whipped cream.

Oyster Dressing

1 large (15c) loaf of bread.

2 cups or cans oysters

½ cup butter

1½ cups milk warmed

Seasoned with salt, pepper & sage

2 eggs well beaten

Break bread into small pieces. Season

and add liquids. Add oysters

just before using.

Katydid Sings Death Song

The katydid's song is a tremendous
rhapsody of life and death. For he
has only a short time to live and he
calls mightily for a mate, a voiceless
female to perpetuate his species. When
the notes trail off, it means that the
katydid is dying and the ground is
soon littered with wings and dismem-
bered bodies. But eggs are left. Out
of them larvae are hatched—slugs that
drop to the ground, burrow down to
nourishing rootlets and build under-
ground cells. For 17 years (13 in the
South) the katydid will live there in
his tiny cell, living on the sap that
flows in the rootlet, and then, properly
winged, will crawl out to vault
into the sun and sing again his song
of love.

Ruler's Residence

Among the rulers' palaces with dis-
tinctive names are included the Vati-
can, or residence of the pope; the
Quirinal or residence of the king of
Italy; the Escorial of the former
rulers of Spain; the Elysee, residence
of the President of France; the Krem-
lin of the former rulers of Russia; the
Marble palace at Potsdam of the
former German rulers; St. James', of-
ficial residence of the British ruler.
Titles of the world's rulers include
Presidents, kings,
