

Washington Snapshots

Reports from within the Administration that President Roosevelt has instructed agencies to cut out overhead during the coming year will probably bring the most unanimous approval of any move he has made during the past year, if carried through. With business steadily improving and unemployment decreasing since the NRA decision, many economists believe that a definite move to halt unnecessary spending would add a fresh stimulus for recovery. Particularly would this be true, it is pointed out, if the "breathing spell" decreed during the summer by President Roosevelt is carried through the coming session of Congress without new business control legislation enacted.

Whether this course will be followed has the closest political observers guessing. The Supreme Court is expected to overturn some of the New Deal legislation during the winter, and the attitude of officials in this event will be an important factor in the recovery. If the decrees of the high court are accepted and new measures are written within the bounds of the Constitution, it will be an incentive to industry to speed re-employment with new confidence.

That the "breathing spell" is to be lasting and that the Administration has realized that too much legislation already has blocked recovery is indicated by the speech which the Secretary of Commerce recently made. At the same time the Secretary of Commerce's speech was widely interpreted as being a direct challenge to young members of the Brain Trust who have lashed out at business. Whether the Secretary was speaking with the blessing of the President, as many inferred, is not known. But he said:

"Business profits cannot be penalized, or the profit-and-loss system will suffer with a bad case of angina pectoris. Businesses making profit during the depression have been held up to censure because it was pointed out that millions were unemployed, while companies were actually paying dividends. This contrast is unfair."

"As long as we maintain our present capitalistic system—and it will be maintained—no obstructions or deterrents must be permanently set up to prevent fair and reasonable profits."

Secretary Roper, referring to the President's breathing spell letter, said "this declaration of the President is clearcut and concrete. It means that business no longer needs to feel any uncertainty as to what may come in the future with respect to governmental measures."

Undoubtedly this statement by the Cabinet officer has had wide repercussions, and official Washington is watching to see the extent to which it will be followed. Probably the first actual yardstick will be provided when President Roosevelt sends his message to Congress in January.

Before that, however, the observers are keeping their eye on the conferences called for early in December to consider new NRA legislation. These conferences to which several thousand business men have been invited will be used as a sounding board for sentiment upon the question. Meeting four days earlier on December 4, the Congress of American Industries in conjunction with the annual convention of the National Association of Manufacturers, will speak industry's mind on the question.

OSC Student Sees Chinese Drama

An Oregon student, Graden Fisk, of Mapewood, is having a close-up view of the tense international developments between China and Japan. Fisk is an exchange student this year, going from OSC, to spend his junior year at Lingnan university, Canton, China. He has written to friends here that there is considerable military activity in south China and that the strategy seems to be to hamper and delay Japan long enough to allow China's preparedness campaign to gain further momentum. China feels that given more time she will present a powerful united front against Japan Fisk writes.

Henry Hagg Given Receives Five Year 4-H Leader Award

Henry G. Hagg, dairyman of Reedville, and leader of the Reedville dairy club, and John Schmeltzer, fruit and nut grower of the Chehalis Mountain district, and leader of the Chehalis Mountain potato club, have received awards this year in recognition of having served as leaders of 4-H clubs for five years.

The first two years of Mr. Hagg's leadership he had a pig club and for the last three years the dairy club. While his club members are younger boys yet they have made a very creditable showing in club work. At this year's Washington county fair they were successful in winning a grand championship, a first, second and two third places with the six animals that they entered. In addition to this Richard Hagg, one of the members succeeded in winning the D. G. Lilly heifer which was awarded to the exhibitor the highest scoring grade Jersey heifer calf. Howard Trachsel, another member, won the J. E. Inlay and Sons, 4-H club Summer School scholarship for having exhibited the highest scoring dairy animal. The club completed its work 100 per cent for the past year.

Mr. Schmeltzer has for five years led the Chehalis Mountain Potato club, which is the oldest 4-H club in Washington county. During his period of leadership the Chehalis Mountain potato club banquet was started. This is an annual banquet sponsored by the club and is receiving considerable recommendation of late. This club sent the winning crops demonstration team to the state fair this year, members of the team being James and George Allison. Three scholarships have been won by members of the club, George and James Allison each winning scholarships presented by the State Fair and the First Bank of Tigrard. The other scholarship which is sponsored by the club itself was won by Perone Ego. The Chehalis Mountain potato club has also completed its work for the past year 100 per cent.

The addition of these two five year leaders makes a total of four active leaders in the county who have been leading clubs for five years or more. Other veteran leaders are F. H. Jossy, leader of the Rock Creek dairy club, who has had seven years service and Albert Jansen, leader of the Verboort corn club, who had been a leader for six years.

Boy Scout Training Period Dates Named

The first of a series of courses in training Boy Scouts will start Dec. 10 at the Trinity Episcopal church parish hall, Northwest Nineteenth avenue and Davis street, according to an announcement by William F. Johnson, local scout executive.

New Grass Nurseries Seeded

THE DALLES — To determine the adaptability of certain varieties of grasses in their respective vicinities, two Wasco county farmers have recently cooperated with County Agent W. Wray Lawrence in seeding forage crop nurseries on their farms, using seed obtained from the Moro Experiment station. One of these, on the farm of W. L. Smith of Kingsley, has been seeded to Ampla spicatum, Poa ampla, Crested Wheat grass, Selected Crested Wheat grass, Bulbous bluegrass and Idaho Fescue. The other on the farm of J. R. Fleming of Baker, is seeded to Crested Wheat grass, bluebunch wheatgrass, big bluegrass, bulbous bluegrass and Indian rice.
