Cost of Government one-third of National Income

In 1934 the national income was approximately \$48,000,000,000 and the total cost of all government, local, state and national, is estimated by the National Industrial Conference Board as being \$15,500,000,000. Today the total cost of government is equal to one-third of the national income. Today taxation, local, state and national, absorbs between 20% and 25% of the income of the people. The balance of governmental spending represents debt that will inevitably lead to greater taxation.

We urge all who have no other church home to worship with us.

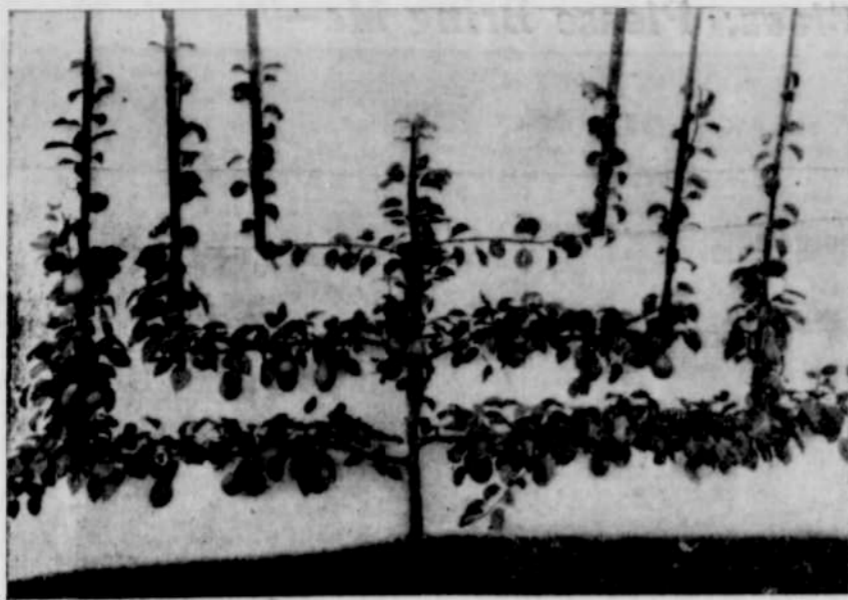

Unique, Decorative Fruit Trees Introduced into the United States

After pioneering for six years, an Espalier Fruit Tree nursery now offers hardy, bearing trees, for sale to the gardener and decorative landscape gardener homeowner. The U. S. Espalier Nursery, Inc., 6304 S. W. Vermont Street, Portland, have experimented with some 70 varieties of espalier fruit trees, original stock being imported from England, Germany, France and Switzerland. Mrs. Kochlin entertained the idea of commencing on this unique decorative trees for this country, adventure upon visiting her old home in Europe nine years since. She has surrounded herself with an expert staff of nurserymen and has achieved encouraging results to the extent where she is able to guarantee a hardy, bearing tree, when transplanted to your property, which will continue to bear luscious, over-size fruits throughout the years.

About 20 acres of nursery ground have been especially prepared for the propagation of the genuine stock of espalier fruit and these are now under cultivation for future delivery.

The genuine espalier fruit trees differs from the ordinary tree in that it is not grown on the usual stock on which most trees are grown, but it is grafted on stock which has a root system of an entirely different character. Its feeding ability is greater and has not only the tendency of much earlier bearing, sometimes bearing the first year after planting, but the fruit grown on these trees is much larger in size, more attractive in color, superior in flavor and the structure of the meat is finer in quality.

Espalier fruit trees are unique in the amount of space required. Consequently a greater variety of fruit can be had on a given space, especially in the small home garden where small space can be utilized, such as fences for excluding the garden from public gaze and thereby enhancing the flowers and formal gardens. Beauty of blossoms and form of the growing tree adds much to the landscaping of your grounds. Espalier trees may be planted to advantage for decorations at the side of the house much in the manner of vines, beside a wall or fence, at arches along garden paths or beside the garage.

Only a fair trial will convince the reader of how much enjoyment and recreation can be found in training a few of the genuine espalier fruit trees in your garden. A view of trees on display at the U. S. Espalier Nursery will arouse the interest of anyone who enjoys gardening and landscaping in the least.

U. S. Espalier Nursery also has dwarf trees on display, standing little more than one or two feet high which bear one or more boxes of fruit. Fruit especially adapted to this territory includes pears, apples, peaches, prunes and cherries. Spraying is only necessary once a year and you may spray from the ground as the average tree is no taller than six feet. These trees are more hardy than the domestic type and grow on one plane, thereby not excluding sunlight from the garden or terrace as you will, while trees may be trained to shade porches and such at the grower's will.
