Washington Snapshots

WASHINGTON SNAPSHOTS

Behind-the-scenes talk in Washington centers nowadays around what apparently will be a prompt test of President Roosevelt's control over Congress. For the first time since he took office, his Capitol Hill leaders have spent days in pre-session discussions about what Congress should do when it meets January 3.

Each year until this one, party congressional big-wigs, stayed home until the last minute. Then they rushed into routine organization work, having little time to talk about the legislative program.

Last session, their first opportunity for such a discussion was at the White House the night Congress opened. All the leaders had ideas but were not united. Consequently they accepted the President's plans without much dissent.

This summer, however, a couple of dozen congressional chiefs went to the Philippines. Among them were Vice President Garner, Speaker Byrnes, Senator Robinson of Arkansas, the Senate Democratic leader and Representative Doughton of North Carolina, chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, which originates all tax tariff laws.

They whiled away hours and even days aboard ship with talk, agreeing tentatively on what they thought should be the session's business. Their plan called for a brief meeting with action on the bonus, annual appropriations, relief neutrality, and lesser odds and ends.

The general expectations, therefore, is that the first White House gathering this year will be a round-table debate with the leaders having something to say for themselves this time.

One thing they will present is a suggestion that the President think twice before vetoing the bonus again. Garner said last session he thought the President's disapproval of the Patman \$2,000,000,000 bonus payment, currency inflation bill poor politics in the year before an election, even though the measure was pure class legislation.

The same bill will be called up for a House vote January 13. Some of Doughton's friends say he will have his committee meet before that date to approve a bill not so drastically inflationary. It could be offered as a substitute for the Patman plan. It may call for payment of the bonus in bonds negotiable now but redeemable in 1945—the year the bonus is due—at face value.

Another problem besets the President. Some Cabinet members, among them Postmaster General Farley and Secretary Roper, say the "brain trusters" are talking too much. They have told the "chief" that in no unmistakable terms. But Tugwell, Hopkins, Ickes and Wallace, against whom the bitterest complaints were made, naturally think their speeches predicting revolution are helping the Administration.

Arthur J. Altmeyer, head of the new Social Security Board, remarks cheerfully that 28,000,000 wage earners will be covered by unemployment insurance laws within the next three months. But he doesn't say anything about how much their pay checks will be reduced by the taxes necessary to make the plan function.

education can put them there. A recent analysis sets forth five possible policies of government relief with estimates of the respective costs:

1. DOLES: Estimated cost about \$1,500,000,000 a year.

2. PRODUCTION FOR USE: This means idle factories, raw materials, and labor to make goods for unemployed. Estimated cost about \$1,000,000,000 a year.

3. LARGE SCALE PUBLIC WORKS: Costs unpredictable, but running into many billions.

4. MIXTURE OF WORK-RELIEF AND PUBLIC WORKS: Estimated cost \$3,000,000,000 to \$4,000,000,000 a year.

5. STRAIGHT WORK-RELIEF: Estimated yearly cost to create 3,500,000 jobs is \$2,000,000,000 to \$2,500,000,000.

"DRAFTING WORKERS"

There is another proposed method which I believe is better than any of the five listed above. It is the so-called Quota Plan for dealing with America's volcano of unemployment. It resembles the NRA to some extent but it is much sounder and more in line with actual business experience. Under this plan, corporations would be given the option of paying taxes in cash, or in jobs.

Undoubtedly such a plan would be an immense relief to most business organizations. They would feel they were getting something for their tax payments instead of throwing the money down a rat-hole. To the unemployed it would mean a return to normal, wholesome life, instead of the demoralizing pauperdom of the dole or fake work. To the whole nation, this Quota Plan would be protection against the volcanic menace of chronic unemployment!

A New Year's Resolution

One problem that confronts us as we approach the coming of the New Year is the eternal problem of feeding a hungry family three times every single day of the year—and such a vital problem surely deserves a few minutes serious consideration. No matter how the housewife may feel—no matter how busy she may be—the family must eat. And if they are to be at all well and happy they must eat adequately and regularly.

If you decide to make a New Year's resolution it could very well be this: "To see that my family, especially the children, get plenty of the essential foods every day."

The first on the list of the essential foods, of course, will be milk. Milk is a body-builder and any reasonable person knows that growing, active children need plenty of body-building material. Milk supplies more of the food essentials than any one food—it is said to be the most nearly perfect food one can find.

In the first place one quart of milk supplies to the body two-thirds of the daily requirement of this body-building material called protein. It furnishes ALL the calcium required daily by the body—and if the mother feeds her family Vitamin D milk, the calcium is more readily and completely utilized by the body. Calcium makes for adequate bone structure. In the first place it is important that expectant mothers drink at least a quart of milk each day to insure a perfectly formed child at birth. Some doctors even supplant the amount of calcium found in milk by encouraging the use of calcium tablets in addition—that's how important calcium is. And as the child grows he must have it for the bones of the body and the development of good sound teeth. And in addition milk supplies important vitamins also necessary for growth and for keeping the body in good health.

Besides milk we should resolve to include two vegetables and two fruits each day, and eggs, meat or fish. There never seems to be much trouble in including breakfast foods and bread in the family diet, also sweets in one form or another, so we need not think too much about them. Milk, fruits, vegetables, and eggs are the important foods to consider in this New Year's resolution because they are the foods that are rich in the minerals and vitamins that promote growth and increase resistance to disease. Of course, it does take a little time to plan ahead and every day see that these essentials are included in the family diet, but think of the time, worry and expense ultimately saved—a family of sturdy children comparatively free of colds and the fatigue which is so typical of individuals who are improperly fed.

So let one New Year's resolution be to see that each child in your family shall consume in some manner one quart of milk each day during the coming year, and each adult one pint and in addition to this, an abundance of fruits, vegetables and eggs.
