Strawberry Production
Topic of Meeting Called
Tuesday, February 4WM. F. CYRUS
County Agent

How can the profitable production of a strawberry planting be prolonged? What is the cost under present conditions to establish a planting and care for it and harvest the crop? Is there anything in the local, state, and national situation to warrant an expansion of small fruit production locally? How can we avoid producing substandard prunes? These are a few of the questions members of the small fruit and tree fruit committee groups are puzzling over in working out a tentative report to present to growers of the county on February 4th. On that date and the following day, February 4, the two or three months of study and consideration of Washington county producers will be brought to a conclusion when they submit their reports and recommendations.

Both these horticultural groups are meeting this week to begin working out their report after spending nearly two months in assembling the facts and figures pertaining to crops. The small fruit group is as follows: W. E. Marr; Banks; A. J. Rowell; Scholls; W. Croop; Banks; Ed Schlegel; Banks; J. O. Bager, Sherwood. The tree fruit group is as follows: Frank Lewis, Forest Grove; Peter Pearson, Gaston; J. W. Forney, Gaston; Perry La Follette, Cornelius; Herb Normandin, Forest Grove; Sam Webb, Cornelius; John Hulsman, Cornelius; John Schmeltzer, Sherwood.

These growers are finding that the recommendations made by previous groups in 1925 were generously accurate and that the things that were pointed out at that time have quite generally taken place. Growers have expressed themselves as being pleased with the idea of going over these things and apparently figure that much benefit may be derived from such a series of studies.

Other commodity committees will be meeting from time to time between now and February 1 and getting their reports into shape.
