The Light Meal at Night

In every home where it is human-
ly possible to arrange it, the young-
er members of the family should be
served their heavy meal at noon and
the light meal at night. When chil-
dren have reached school age and
find it impossible to be at home for
the noon meal this plan is very
nearly impossible. In such cases the
evening meal must be planned very
carefully and if it includes plenty
of vegetables and fresh milk with
fruit as the dessert, the meal will be
nourishing and at the same time
light enough to allow for refreshing
sleep and complete digestion.

If the children are under school
age a real effort should be made to
serve the light meal at night. Such
an arrangement necessitates addi-
tional thought and considerable
additional cooking but the results war-
rant it. Since "early to bed" is a
requisite, feed the pre-school child
an hour or so before the adults eat.
And if the housewife has help in the
kitchen, the father and mother may
prefer eating later and getting the
child to bed first.

And now, what to serve? It's all
fairly simple if we keep in mind to
include milk, a vegetable or fruit or
both, cereals in some form, and an
egg if it hasn't been served earlier
in the day.

Young children are often served
cereals twice a day. If cooked in
milk they are more palatable and
more nourishing as well, and when
molded with dates or raisins or top-
ped with fruit they offer a deligh-
tful change.

Creamed vegetable soups served
with buttered toast and perhaps a
Rice Custard Pudding with raisins
make an attractive combination.
Milk toast with plenty of butter of-
fers an excellent and popular main
dish. Goldenrod Eggs or Eggs a la
King also offer a most attractive
basic dish, and when supplemented
with a glass of milk, a wedge of
salted lettuce and fruit for dessert,
you have a well balanced meal that
will meet the essential food require-
ments of a growing child.

to a boil. Season. Serve on toast.
This serves six.

are not cut into the white sauce but
are put thru a sieve and sprinkled
on top, giving the light fluffy ap-
pearance of goldenrod.
