flated. Uncontrolled credit expansion is not quite as dangerous as the violent "printing press" money type, but the bad effects are only a question of degree!

REAL ISSUE

Probably the easiest way in which credit inflation can get out of hand is through reckless public spending. History shows the latter has always degenerated into "printing press" inflation. Business today although 9 per cent below normal, is 18 per cent above a year ago, and 60 per cent above the depression low. The necessity for public "pump priming" must be decidedly less than it was three years ago. Yet there has been

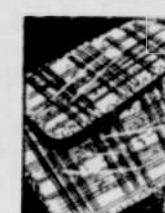
