Twelve County Teachers On Educational Project

Twelve teachers are now teaching in Washington County on the state-wide adult and nursery school project sponsored under the WPA by the State Department of Education, according to an announcement by C. A. Howard, State Superintendent of Public Instruction.

These teachers are: Lois Furlie, Clara M. Whitford, Carl E. Berggren, Christine R. Davis, Eugene Pantotti, Nina Holbrook, Wm. J. Shafer Heien Wilcox, Lora A. Smith, Hazel Becker, adult education teachers and Marie Melanson and Mary L. Enslin, nursery school teachers.

In the state at large there are approximately 300 teachers instructing some 800 adult classes and conducting 19 nursery schools for children ages two to five from relief families.

A variety of adult classes are being taught this year including Americanization classes for the foreign-born, public speaking, economics, first aid, crafts parent education, commercial law English, hobbies, sewing cooking, recreation, literature, social problems, radio aviation ground school course and similar classes.

Any person interested in enrolling in any of the above courses may obtain further information as to time and exact place of meeting for classes by calling or writing the office of county school superintendent.

Most of these instructors are available for more classes to be organized in such communities in which at least ten persons are willing to enroll for a given subject.
