**Statehouse
Gossip**

Friday the voters will be called upon to vote upon four statewide measures and numerous local issues. It has often been stated that the

"no" vote will predominate but this may not be true in at least one of the issues—the changing of the primary date from May to September. This is perhaps the only one which would succeed.

The other three measures include the sales tax of from one half of one per cent to two per cent for the old age assistance. It is estimated this would raise between \$3,000,000 to \$4,000,000 a year to match federal money. The sum would permit a maximum of \$30 a month to all the estimated 18,000 over 65 years of age.

Governor Martin over the past week-end came out with a plea for support of this tax, or else the old aged would be denied support and the federal assistance would be lost. He declared that if it were defeated he would not call a special session of the legislature, in other words—"It is up to you. Take it or leave it."

The governor in his campaign had declared himself opposed to new taxes on the people of the state. He clarifies it with the statement that for any ordinary purpose he would oppose the sales tax, but that in this emergency he would be wholeheartedly for it. He declared the situation was serious and one for human solution.

The other two measures included the one to permit the legislature to set its own salary for members, to raise at least from \$3 a day to \$5 a day. The second would repeal the compulsory \$5 a term student fee.

But the vote at the special election will be only about 40 per cent of the registered voters and the list of registered voters has dropped 57,000 under that of the general election in 1934. Little interest is being shown despite the claims of the Townsendites that the greatest registration in history would be recorded.

At last Jack Allen, state liquor control administrator, has resigned. This has been predicted for months. His resignation, A. K. McMahan, chairman, said was not requested. But conditions were such that they made it unbearable for him to remain as administrator. He was but a figurehead, with Eugene Kelty the administrator.

Kelty, a republican, has been assistant administrator in name. He cannot be advanced to the first job, because the democrats would set up a howl. He has been under fire as it were, although an excellent officer, Kelty, it has been learned will, resign shortly for an outside position. The man who will succeed Allen, in name and fact, will be Otto J. Runtz, who now is supervisor of the liquor stores. He has been increasingly active in commission meetings of late, and is a democrat. Who will be named to Kelty's place or obtain the job as supervisor had not been ascertained.

With these changes on the liquor control commission, perhaps much of the fire which is being built under the organization by various disgruntled factions, will burn out. At any rate McMahan rates high with the governor and would not be removed as commissioned chairman unless the pressure got too great.

A visit to the office of W. L. Josselin, secretary to the governor, will be revealing. His office has the best appointments of any in the

state government and his private room has the rich appearance far beyond anything even in the old capitol. "Pinky" Josselin, of course, picked out the furnishings himself, and they are elaborate.

Beautiful hangings, rich mirrors, blue leathered chairs with an exquisite desk and an expensive rug are among the appointments. His office outshadows even the governor's which has been fixed up very nicely. Wonder what a farmer taxpayer would think if he had a chance to gain admission to the office of Mr. Josselin.

But, since Josselin is the chief patronage dispenser, especially among the young democrats, his surroundings should be comparable with his power no doubt. But the reaction may not be all that the Harvard graduate, just turning 30, may desire. But in the meantime "Pinky" still reigns.

The resignation of George G. Brown, for 41 years a clerk of the state land board, the chief position held for 33 years, was one of the highlights the past week. He was permitted to resign voluntarily, but it was understood it would only have been a matter of time before the execution—Holman having been adamant against him.

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It's Industry's Job

New York—(IPS)—Belief that only business can solve the unemployment problem, and will do so if uncertainties as to the future are removed, was expressed here recently by Phillip Cabot, professor of business administration at Harvard University.

He contended that public works expenditures do not reach the basic trouble, but that business can "absorb unemployment." The reason business did not make greater headway in that direction in 1935, he said, is:

"A businessman can't act with so many variables being introduced into his business as there have been in the last three years. For one thing, they don't know what is law—they may wake up any morning and find the whole system crumbling."
