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BEATE SOFIA HETTESATER

Miss Beate Sofia Hettesater, 70, of Garden Home, was killed instantly early in the evening of January 25, near her home when she was struck by an automobile after she had dismounted from a Garden Home bus.

Operator of the car involved was Donald B. Ragen, 1831, Southwest Fourteenth avenue, State Officer Al Johnson reported. Upon investigation of the accident by the state patrolman and Coroner Earl Donelson of Hillsboro, Ragen was released upon his own recognizance pending any action by the Washington County district attorney.

Miss Hettesater was returning to her home from Portland, where she was employed as bookkeeper for the painting firm of Williams & Bled, according to a sister with whom she made her home. The victim had started to walk across the highway when struck. Ragen reportedly declared that darkness and the dark clothing of the woman prevented him from seeing her until too late.

The body was sent to the W. E. Pegg funeral parlors at Beaverton.

She is survived by a sister-in-law, Mrs. R. Hettesater, Garden Home, and Mrs. Olof Hettesater, Seattle. Three nieces here. Mrs. Jennie Mayfield, Garden Home; Mrs. L. T. Johnson, Gladstone; Miss Helen Hettesater, student at Oregon State College, Corvallis; and several nieces and nephews in the East. She was a sister of the late Dr. R. Hettesater of Garden Home. Miss Hettesater was born in Bergen, Norway, and lived at Garden Home the past twenty-five years.

Funeral services were held Monday, January 27th at the Garden Home Community Church, with interment at Crescent Grove Cemetery. Arrangements were in charge of W. E. Pegg, Beaverton.

convince farmers that the AAA had been responsible for the return of farm prosperity. The anti-Roosevelt forces would stand to gain in this instance.

3. If we have another honest-to-goodness year of drought and crops are as poor as they were in 1934 and the spring of 1935, farm income would be decidedly lower. Prices would rise, but in the absence of substantial carry-overs the upping of prices would not offset the poor harvest. Hence, the failure of his crops plus the absence of his AAA check, would be a double blow to the farmer. And that might mean more votes for Roosevelt.

CONCLUSION

So the weather may be the deciding factor in the coming election. But in analyzing the Triple-A decision, the important point to remember is that prices do not determine the standard of living. Higher living standards simply mean more goods to divide among everybody. Both the NRA and AAA caused an artificial restriction of goods and would eventually have meant a static standard of living. Only the desire to work harder and to be of service—the result of a spiritual revival—can bring permanent prosperity to farm and city alike!

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
