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Relentless Facts

Some time ago in a national broadcast, President Roosevelt said: "Facts are relentless." Having thus placed himself on record neither he nor his followers should object to statements of fact.

When campaigning in Pittsburgh in October 1932, Candidate Roosevelt declared:

(A) "I regard reduction in federal spending as one of the most important issues of this campaign. In my opinion it is the most direct and effective contribution that government can make to business."

(B) "Before any man enters my cabinet he must give me a twofold pledge of first, absolute loyalty to the Democratic platform and especially the economy plank; and second, complete cooperation with me looking to economy and reorganization of his department."

(C) "Our federal extravagance and improvidence bear a double evil; our whole people and our business cannot carry its excessive burdens of taxation; second, our credit structure is impaired by the unorthodox federal financing made necessary by the unprecedented magnitude of these deficits."

(D) "Instead of financing the billion dollar deficit of 1931 in the regular way our government simply absorbed that much of the lending capacity of the banks, and, by so much, impaired the credit available for business."

(E) "I shall carry out the plain precept of our party which is to reduce the cost of current federal government operations by 25 per cent. Of course that means a complete re-alignment of the unprecedented bureaucracy that has assembled in Washington in the last four years." Under the extravagant leadership of President Roosevelt federal, state and local governments are spending approximately \$16,000,000,000 annually. Whereas in 1929 the government was spending 14.1 per cent of our annual income in 1935 it spent 26.7 per cent of our national earnings. American citizens, under the New Deal, from the pick and shovel man to the millionaire are being taxed to such an extent that all are indirectly working three months out of each year for the government.

Mr. Roosevelt declared that each cabinet member should pledge loyalty to the Democratic platform. That platform has not been adhered to by either the president or any of his cabinet. What actually has been done is carrying out the promises made by Norman Thomas, the Socialist candidate, who polled less than a million votes in the 1932 election.

Mr. Roosevelt was critical of the one billion dollar deficit of 1931. Since his inauguration the government has engaged in a spending orgy that has impaired the credit of business. For 1935 the deficit was \$3,575,000,000. It is now apparent that government expenditures for 1936 will reach to at least \$5,000,000,000 above our annual income.

Mr. Roosevelt's promise to reduce government operations by 25 per cent and make a realignment of "unprecedented bureaucracy" has proven to be a campaign prop. Under the New Deal there has been developed the greatest bureaucracy the nation has ever known. In March 1935, a total of 2,159,835 persons received federal government checks.

In December 1935, a total of 9,047,956 persons received federal government pay checks.

These are facts that President Roosevelt regards as "relentless."

DALLAS—The Farmers Union Oil Company, organized in 1931, has grown steadily and is now confined to Polk county operators, according to County Agent J. R. Beck. A recent report shows total assets of \$9,223.63, including plant and equipment. The organization last year handled 288,877 gallons of gasoline and 146,384 gallons of tractor fuel. In addition to selling these products direct to farmers at regular competitive prices the cooperative paid dividends to members of \$4.843 in 1935.
