A Dance Audience Grows

"Another house sold out to the last inch of standing room."

This is the unflattering report that accompanies the recitals of Martha Graham great American dancer who will appear on Monday, March 23, at the Portland Public auditorium.

Since her debut in New York in 1926, Miss Graham has steadily increased the number of her concert performances until she is now presenting in New York City more dance recitals than any other single modern dancer.

"In the face of the managerial boycott on American dancers," John Martin, dance critic of the New York Times, wrote "with no fashionable clique to back her she has nevertheless built up the largest cash-paying, ticket-buying audience of any native dancer who appears in New York. Given a fair opportunity, there is every indication that the same thing would follow in other cities."

This season will mark Miss Graham's first nation-wide tour. For the first time she will sweep beyond the borders of the conventional

dance spheres to untold territory. Commentators point to a new era in dance history, for this year and there are indications of a new and widespread interest in the dance in this country. The American dance has stepped out of its swaddling clothes.

Old Mistress of Seas Still Floats

Said to be the oldest iron hull afloat, the barge Diamond Head may be seen any day, moored to G. P. docks, in Lake Union, Seattle. Launched in London, England, in 1866, as the Lady Gainsborough, she was considered the finest ship of her time. This sailing vessel, which carried passengers and fine merchandise, was so fast that she held her own in competition with steam vessels. She had a long and romantic career. Her last active service was as an oil tanker under the ownership of Captain John Barneson, founder of General Petroleum Corporation.

Largest Wood Panel in the World

At right is illustrated the biggest solid panel of wood in the world . . . a piece 8 feet by 16 feet, cut from a giant Oregon pine tree. It is located on the building of Davis Hardwood Company, San Francisco. Thus, displayed in California, bearing the name of Oregon and having originally come from Hoquiam, Wash., this panel is of all-embracing Pacific Coast interest. Some conception of its size may be gained by comparison with the figure of A. J. Donnelly, the tall gentleman standing alongside the panel.
