\$4,000,000,000 Deficit Probable for Next Year

WASHINGTON, (IPS)—A deficit of \$4,000,000,000—a new record—appears in store as a result of the recent request that Congress appropriate \$1,500,000,000 for relief. In round numbers, this would bring total expenditures for the next fiscal year beginning July 1, to nearly \$10,000,000,000. If Congress enacts a tax bill raising as much revenue as the President asked, the total income will be almost \$6,000,000,000, leaving the \$4,000,000,000 deficit.

The total federal public debt has risen to \$31,447,106,057. The \$4,000,000,000 deficit would make it very nearly \$36,000,000,000 by June 30, 1937, despite the proposed new taxes.

though he has not had political experience he should be able to "put over" the reforms which he advocates.

BORAH AND VANDENBERG. Senator Borah has the lowest record in this survey. Though it is believed that he would be a good

"vote getter", yet business men seem to fear him. He has high principles and great courage, but has a record for being erratic. Senator Borah has a wonderful voice which is bound to be a very important factor in the coming presidential campaign. The election may be won or lost on the radio. This nation is ruled by emotions, not by wisdom. If the radio had existed in Bryan's time he would have beaten McKinley by millions of votes.

Senator Vandenberg certainly has energy and vigor. He knows what he wants and frankly goes after it. When I was last at a Gridiron club dinner in Washington, I sat near him. He gave me no indication at that time that he would in any way consider a Presidential nomination. My guess is that he feels that the Republicans will not be successful this year and hence is waiting until 1940 when he believes a Republican victory is assured. However, in the coming conflict at the Convention between the Conservatives under Hoover's leadership and the radicals under Borah's banner, Vandenberg may be the compromise candidate.

CONCLUSION

Personally, I can never get excited about politics. I believe that elections reflect people's sentiments rather than direct people's decisions. I am sure that conditions make Presidents, rather than that Presidents make conditions. Furthermore, I know that the country always goes too far in one direction and then reacts in the other direction. The time always arrives when the people of this country become dissatisfied with the results of existing policies and turn to new leaders, throwing out the administration of that day and replacing it with another. But I have a hunch that the majority are still in favor of giving the Roosevelt administration further opportunity to show what it can do.

Of course, the above is based solely on current conditions. A change may come about or something may happen between now and November third which would greatly alter my opinion. Therefore, I am making no forecast now as to who will be elected in November; but am simply reviewing the situation based on conditions as evident at the moment. One thing more: Whoever political party is successful in 1936, will probably be defeated in 1940. Think that over!
