

Oregon Republican Club Opens Headquarters in Failing Bldg., Portland

Portland, Ore., April 10—(Special)—State headquarters for the Oregon Republican club have been opened this week in Portland at 927 Failing building, Lowell C. Paget, president of the State organization, announces that Miss Jeanette Calkins will be in charge of the offices. A general invitation is issued to all Republicans to inspect the new quarters.

The Oregon Republican club has been designated as the official organization through which young Republicans of the state are to be marshaled into line for the coming campaign, according to word sent Mr. Paget by J. Kenneth Bradley, chairman of the Young Republican National Federation which has headquarters in Washington. Bradley's action came by direction of the National Committee.

"Now that we have established headquarters," said Mr. Paget, "we can take care of the many inquiries that have been coming in from different parts of Oregon as to the formation of chapters of the Oregon Republican club. The widespread enthusiasm being shown is indicative of the spirit of determination which is motivating the Republicans throughout the country."

Mr. Ickes Leading Man in Comedy of Old Mill

The people of Washington, D. C., are enjoying an opportunity to see for themselves how one of the periodic inspirations of the PWA is working out in actual practice. Secretary Harold Ickes of the Interior Department is the leading man in the little real-life skit, which might be appropriately entitled "The Old Mill."

Ickes discovered the mill some time ago and leaped to the decision to rebuild it. The mill was opened in 1819 in Rock Creek Park, now one of the Capital's most beautiful scenic sections, but then a farming area. The mill ran until 1879 and then folded up, in something like the manner of the One Hoss Shay. In later years it had been a tearoom. Mr. Ickes' attention was called to the ancient mill and he decided to restore it and grind wheat in it. The sum of \$19,200 was readily allotted for the purpose from PWA funds.

The work is almost complete. The water is ready to turn the old pitch back wheel. But there is no wheat. Furthermore nobody, not even the Brain Trusters, are thus far able to figure out how wheat can be brought to the mill. Trucks are not permitted on the roads that traverse the serene solitudes of Rock Creek Park.

If wheat is to be delivered at the mill in such small quantities as might be carried in small cars, or by some other means of transportation it would make the cost of the flour, if any, so high that it is probable nobody would buy it.

As matters stand at this writing the old mill is useless except as a monument to something or other, maybe to the New Deal. It produces nothing, whereas, in the good old days, it at least supplied tea and cakes.

Alfred P. Dobson Candidate For Attorney General

Alfred P. Dobson, engaged in the general practice of law in Portland since 1910, is a candidate for the democratic nomination for attorney general. Under the administration of President Wilson he was state counsel for the Oregon alien property custodian, and for ten years was a member of the grievance committee of the State Bar association, serving four years as its chairman.



At the request of democratic and republican friends he Alfred P. Dobson was on two occasions drafted as a candidate for the circuit court bench in Multnomah county, and in 1932 was the democratic nominee for attorney general, receiving the largest number of votes cast for any democratic candidate for a state office.

He has wide experience in the practice of law and is well-known throughout the state.

Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, April 12.

The Golden text is "All flesh shall see the salvation of God" (Luke 3:6).

Among the citations which comprise the Lesson-Sermon is the following from the Bible: "Agree with thine adversary quickly, while thou art in the way with him; lest at any time the adversary deliver thee to the judge, and the judge deliver thee

to the officer and thou be cast into prison" (Matt. 5:25).

The Lesson-Sermon also includes the following correlative passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures", by Mary Baker Eddy: "Agree with thine adversary quickly, while thou art in the way with him. Suffer no claim of sin or of sickness to grow upon the thought. Dismiss it with an abiding conviction that it is illegitimate, because you know that God is no more the author of sickness than He is of sin. You have no law of His to support the necessity either of sin or sickness, but you have divine authority for denying that necessity and healing the sick" (p. 390).
