

A New Kind of Wall

A new type of hollow tile wall has been developed to meet special conditions often encountered in Oregon where a wall is required that will successfully combat low temperatures in the preservation of various kinds of root crops and nursery stock. This wall is based upon the well known fact that dead air spaces built into a wall is one of the best kinds of insulation, often exceeding other types of insulating material. The wall consists of two walls of hollow building tile separated by a four inch air space that is sealed permanently into a dead air space. The tile walls also contain cells which add to the effectiveness of the insulation. The two walls are held together by header tile every few courses in order to strengthen the wall, the entire wall being almost as strong as a solid 12 inch hollow tile wall.

This type of wall is also very effective for basement walls where excessive dampness is encountered as water finds it almost impossible to penetrate through both the tile walls and the dead air space. Where used for this purpose, provision is made at the base of the outside portion of the wall to provide outlet for such water that finds its way into the dead air space. This type of wall

has been found to be better and more economical than any other type of permanent wall, besides being fireproof, vermin proof and decay proof.

The credit for this excellent improvement in permanent building construction goes to engineers of the Columbia Brick Works and Sylvan Brick Company, who offer the facilities of their companies to anyone who has a building problem.

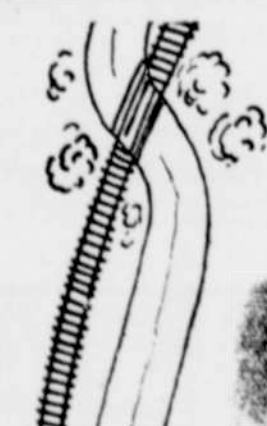

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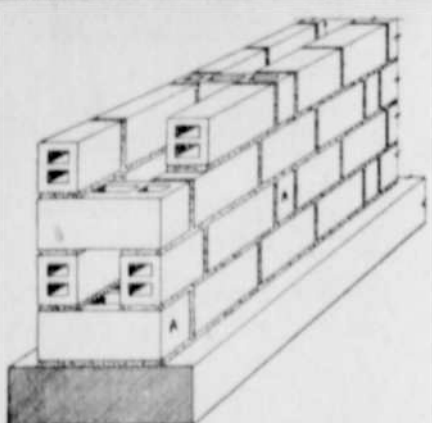
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
