Ben Dorris Republican Candidate for National Committeeman Position



Ben Dorris, candidate for Republican National Committeeman is putting on a state-wide drive in behalf of his candidacy.

Mr. Dorris has the support of most newspapers in the state.

The candidate demands a square deal for Oregon. He maintains that the party has practically disintegrated under the old regime. Dorris has promised, if elected, to visit every section of the state to get first hand information on problems of the county or its candidates.

Dorris is particularly incensed at some of the old guard leaders; he claims that Ralph Williams, present National Republican Committeeman, had informed him before he entered the race that he would not be a candidate for re-election. In all good faith, Dorris then entered the republican primaries only to learn later that Williams had decided to run on the pretext that he was drafted by the young republicans. Dorris points out that no republican organization has officially endorsed Williams. He claims that Williams had used that as a pretext and excuse to enter the political race and that the only reason that Williams was induced to enter the race was the desire of the old guard for his old job when the republican success returns.

Dorris is one of the best known citizens in the state. He is a veteran of the World War and was wounded in action while fighting for his country. He is popular among the veterans ranks. In 1932 when the national American Legion convention was held in Portland, Dorris was executive vice-president and was the actual manager of the convention.

He takes issue with those who claim that Senator Fred Steiwer of Oregon was selected the key-note of the republican national convention because of Williams' "pull". Dorris claims that Steiwer was selected on his record; that he is one of the best known republican leaders in the United States and probably the only republican who was satisfactory to all the presidential aspirants.

Dorris has spent the last week of his campaign in Portland. He has several radio talks scheduled and will try to reach the voters via the air.

Alexander Sweek's Brother, Thad, Dead

Thad Sweek, Seattle, died there Sunday, according to word received here by his brother, Alexander Sweek. Mr. Sweek was born in Tualatin, Or., the son of John and Malina Sweek, who came to Oregon in 1852. County Fair Dates Set For Sept. 3-5

Sanitary Problems up before City Council

The City Council received a letter April 30 from the Oregon State Health Board, which is in itself explanatory. The Council has been struggling along for years to change sanitary conditions here and now sanitation will have to be taken soon. The matter was discussed at this week's meeting and letters are being sent out to many residents, a copy of which is published below, so that they will see the necessity of remedying unsanitary conditions at once.

Mayor Wilson and Council Gentlemen:

Our Sanitary Engineer, Mr. Green, investigated methods of sewage disposal in your town on April 29 and found that in many places sink drains overflow from grease traps, septic tanks and cesspools being discharged in the open along the street. Such conditions are both a nuisance and a menace to health and should be corrected.

For those having septic tanks, it would be advisable to run waste from sinks into septic tanks in order to dispose of it with the rest of the wastes. . . . If possible the effluent from septic tanks should be disposed of underground by sub-service drain tile or leaching cesspools. In some places the ground is not available for the purpose it is necessary to discharge it into drainage ditches, the ditches should be tied and covered. I am enclosing two bulletins on septic tank construction for your information.

Shippers Assn Bring Facts to Public Notice

Ontario, Or., May 8—For more than two years the waterfront situation along the Pacific coast, from Seattle to San Diego, has been surging between a state of unrest and open violence, with its consequent loss of lives and hundreds of thousands of dollars in property damage.

The economic loss to the people of Oregon is conservatively estimated at several million dollars, according to officials of the Oregon Producers and Shippers association who have made a careful study of labor relations in this state during the past two years.

"Vessels are tied up in California ports today as a result of radical and communistic labor leadership, and determined efforts are being made to extend this same waterfront trouble to the port of Portland, according to W. H. Perkins, manager of the association.

"Two years ago our wheat, our wool, our fruit and other agricultural products in every part of the state lost hundreds of thousands of dollars as a result of these labor disturbances, and unless the people of this state awaken to the danger of the present radical labor leadership up and down the Pacific coast, our growers face the prospect of even greater losses before the pages are closed on the present year.

"The present waterfront trouble in California is not a fight between union and non-union workers. Instead, it is a jurisdictional wrangle between rival labor organizations. Nor was the bloody battle at Seaside, a couple of months ago, in which several lives were sacrificed, a dispute between union and non-union workers. It, too, was a fight precipitated by rival labor leaders for supremacy in that area. In these two recent instances and in many others, the sleek, well-paid, rabble-rousing labor leaders incite their workers to violence and the public, as always, pays the bill.

"Just two weeks ago we witnessed the spectacle of a radical un-American leader of longshoremen in San Francisco coming to Portland to exhort Portland workers to repudiate a federal award of less than two years ago. This immigrant from Australia is not even a citizen of the United States, and yet he defies the constituted authority of this nation.

"This labor leader thrives on violence and discontent, and he is determined that Portland and other Pacific Coast ports shall suffer financial losses even greater than those of two years ago.

"These and other matters of labor relations are questions which concern every citizen of this state. It is indeed fortunate that Oregon has a governor who refuses to be cowed or intimidated by these blatant labor leaders, but public knowledge of the real situation must be obtained and public support must be given our local and state officials if this radical leadership in the labor movement is to be halted.

"No honest man will deny labor the right to organize and to employ all legitimate efforts to obtain the best possible working conditions and wages consistent with the nation's economic status, but when labor attempts to set itself up above the law, then we believe and we are certain that all good citizens are in agreement, that labor leaders must be given to understand that the public has certain rights which must be zealously guarded and protected."

Townsend Rally Well Attended in Spite of Inclement Weather

The county wide Townsend rally held at Forest Grove high school auditorium Sunday, in spite of the terrific down pour of rain, was attended by nearly 700 people, representing clubs through out the whole of Washington County and a few outside visitors. The rally program was in charge of the Forest Grove Townsend club. Robert H. Kelly of Hillsboro, Washington county rally chairman, had charge of the meeting. During the program all candidates seeking political office were introduced but no speeches were allowed, due to the fact that this was not a political convention but a Townsend pep rally. Two special numbers on the program were a dance by Helen Powell and a vocal solo by Elaine Foster, both of Forest Grove club. Mr. Kelly then introduced the State Area Manager, James Logan, who gave a short address and then introduced John H. Wier, the representative from the Western National Regional office who gave the main address of the day.

Following this address a benediction was given by Rev. R. L. Fugnam, president of Hillsboro Townsend club No. 1.
