Brick Growing in Popularity

The use of various colors of facing brick for the facing of stores, residences and apartment buildings continues to grow in popularity, due to the many advantages gained by the use of this time tried material. The rich, deep, varied red colors of brick form an ideal background for the evergreen shrubbery and clinging vines that grow so well here. Such a permanent material need never be torn down as it is impervious to decay that attacks other less permanent materials. The same landscape that charms us in June is apt to appear shabby and dreary in January. It is warmth of color that makes June more beautiful than January—and it is warmth of color that makes brick more beautiful all year 'round, than any other building material. Architects today are doing more beautiful things with brick than ever in the history of architecture—taking full advantage of all the various color tones and mellow shadings in which brick can be easily procured—achieving architectural effects that are obtainable

with no other material. Flowers, sunshine, brick walls—wherever there is color naturally blended, there is beauty.

The use of brick has many advantages in addition to its pleasing appearance, such as a saving in fuel costs; no painting bills every few years; less depreciation over a period of years—therefore, higher resale value; greater loan value; and the satisfaction in owning a permanent and fire-resistant home.

As John Ruskin has said, "I would have, then, our ordinary dwelling houses, to last, and built to be lovely; as rich and full of pleasantness, as may be within and without, and with such differences as might suit and express each man's character and occupation and partly his history."

PERMANENT RELIEF ARMY?
A revival in building would provide work for fifty to seventy-five per cent of our jobless. Naturally this would lighten the relief load. No one can deny that the vast majority of people "on government" would much prefer to work on private jobs and be self-supporting than to accept public charity. Most of these people will be able to get work as the boom in building materializes. Others will find employment in new industries. It is by no means certain that our permanent load of unemployment during the next period of good times will be heavier than it was in 1929.

However, no matter how good business becomes, the depression will leave an ugly scar—a large number of people whom one must support from now on. This is the group who have shifted for themselves in the past, but they have now become educated to the advantages of public support. Those who really want to work do not dare accept a temporary job because of the red-tape necessary to get back on relief. They are becoming shiftless and are rapidly losing their ambition to work, even temporarily. **THE DECLINE IN THE CHARACTER OF THIS GROUP—NOT THE BILLIONS THAT THE TREASURY IS RUNNING INTO THE RED—WILL BE THE REAL COST OF THE DEPRESSION TO THIS NATION.**
