Babson Visualizes Great Future for New Industries

Beaverton, June 5—There are a large group in the United States who feel that technological unemployment can never be totally eliminated. I have been taken to task for saying: "It is by no means certain that our permanent load of unemployed during the next period of good times will be heavier than it was in 1929."

Unemployment Unnecessary

The Social Security Act seems to be spurring employers to replace all unnecessary labor with automatic equipment. In certain operations, one man today is doing the work that twenty men were doing in 1929. The sales manager of a leading mail-order house has recently invented a gadget, run by one person, which takes the place of five workers. A paper mill is installing a one-man machine which will replace fifty operators. Will business have to be twenty times, five times, and fifty times, respectively, higher than in 1929 to provide employment for those people now being thrown out of jobs? "No."

Is the increased use of labor-saving machinery the reason why unemployment has not recovered as rapidly as industrial activity? The answer emphatically is, "No." Our job problem could be solved tomorrow if the building industry were operating at the 1929 level. In my article of two weeks ago I said that fifty to seventy-five per cent of our real unemployed are normally allied with the building industry. But what is to happen to the technologically jobless? The answer rests with the churches and the research laboratories.

More New Inventions Coming

An illustration of the possibilities in research is the electric refrigerator. In 1929—the boom year—\$40,000 electric refrigerators were sold, while last year salesmen delivered 1,590,000. In the roll of embryonic industries today, many will undoubtedly turn in an equally remarkable performance in the next ten years. Others may far outstrip the accomplishments of electric refrigerators. These modern businesses will provide new jobs for millions of workers in factories, offices, and on the road. The real task which faces the workers in a "down-hill" industry is making the shift to a new line of employment. As it was hard for teamsters to become truck drivers, so it is equally hard for ice-men to become electric refrigerator salesmen.

In the vanguard of new industries is the Diesel engine. Last year the output of this industry was two and a half times that of the 1929 boom. Trade authorities are forecasting that the 1935 output will be doubled this year. Diesels are most popular in the tractor field, but many are also used for generating electric power. Truck owners, excited by their skyrocketing tax bills are looking at Diesels for fuel savings. The most spectacular use of this engine so far has been in the railroad industry although I am inclined to believe that the streamlined train is largely an advertising stunt. More practical is the possibility of a double-decked Diesel train for high-speed commutation travel.

"100 Miles a Gallon"

In addition to the Diesel engine in the motor field, there are several other new departures. One of my associates saw recently at the Winckler Engineering Laboratories an internal combustion engine with only four

Plans Discussed For Disposal of Untaxed Property

Fifty taxpayers and business men of Beaverton were in attendance at a meeting Tuesday evening in the Kiwanis Hall, for the purpose of discussing means of clearing title and disposing of property which has been removed from the tax rolls by foreclosure of assessment liens by the Town of Beaverton.

The following resolution passed by the council will best explain procedure by which the problem will be adjusted. Resolved: That it is the will of this committee that the Mayor and Council of the Town of Beaverton be advised to expedite the return to the tax rolls of all properties which have been removed therefrom through the foreclosure of unpaid city assessments and all properties subject to foreclosure because of delinquent city assessments which appear to have been abandoned by the owners thereof and upon which no taxes have been paid for the past three years.

And this committee does hereby recommend the following general procedure to that end:

That title to these several properties be perfected by purchase of quitclaim deeds from the last legal owner and mortgage for a nominal consideration in no event to exceed the cost of quieting title through court procedure. That suit be instituted at the earliest reasonable date to quiet title on all such properties not cleared by deed.

That bids be accepted for the purchase of the property in question; That no bid be considered which will be less than the cost of transfer of title to such property plus all expense incident to clearing title if paid by the Town of Beaverton;

That bidders contracting with the said Town to erect acceptable improvements upon the property bid for to the value of not less than \$1500 per unit of not more than 2 lots, shall receive a deed to the property in question for a nominal consideration, plus any and all costs necessary to perfect a good, marketable title if such costs are paid by the said Town of Beaverton.

That bids be received and published as above stated on all or any of the said properties without the consideration of improvement construction contract at prices comparable to selling values of similar properties of private owners, such bids to be considered on a monthly payment basis if so desired.

That property lost through tax foreclosure upon which City lien foreclosure rights exist shall be quitclaimed without cost to purchaser under tax title provided such purchaser shall contract with the Town of Beaverton to improve such property by the construction of acceptable buildings to a value of not less than \$1500 per unit of not more than two lots.
