The Worker Pays

If you think the so-called rich pay all the taxes, and the rest of us receive all the bounty of government for nothing, here are some facts that will disillusion you. They are taken from an editorial in the Charlestown News and Courier, entitled "Taxing the Worker."

Every dollar spent by the Federal government in the last fiscal year was derived as follows:

Seven cents from personal income taxes; eight cents from corporation taxes; six cents from liquor taxes; six cents, from tobacco taxes seven cents from processing taxes; five cents from excise taxes; five cents from customs duties, three cents from estate and gift taxes; four cents from all other forms of taxes.

Practically every one of those taxes is, in effect, a sales tax. Each represents a part of the cost of the things we buy. Each one, with few and unimportant exceptions, must be and is passed on to the consumer.

And that isn't the worst of it. The total of the taxes listed above comes to just 51 cents, leaving 49 cents of each dollar unaccounted for. That forty-nine cents was obtained by borrowing—and when the day of reckoning comes, it will be the worker and the man of average means who will have to foot practically all of the gigantic bill.

Not because "thoughts are things" tangible little bullets which can be sent to a definite objective. If that were true it would be possible to destroy an adversary through the power of thought, and we know that cannot be done—unless he knows you are doing it and is susceptible to the power of suggestion. The effort to send out such thought only destroys the sender. No, the power of thought is in the person employing it. That is why any consistent effort toward right thinking revolutionizes the person doing it, making changes in him which the world can see.

moving parts—only four elements that create friction, reduce efficiency or might get out of order. Contrast this with the 480 pieces in the ordinary automobile engine today. The salt-water battery is a fascinating gadget. This battery and a little motor with a propeller can be attached to your row boat and will run under its own power while it is in the water. Now comes from Canada an announcement of the discovery of a new carburetor which will boost your gasoline efficiency to more than 100 miles per gallon!

Perhaps next in line of possibilities is the pre-fabricated house. This is no longer an engineering problem—it is primarily a question of sales and volume production. Now that the pioneers in this field are cooperating with local builders, faster progress will be made. Air-conditioning also is definitely on the way. Moistening of the air in homes during the winter has become rather common-place. The real market, however, is the development of air-cooling equipment at a cost within the range of the average consumer's pocket-book. Then there is the "flier" airplane with which the Department of Commerce has been experimenting. Dispersion of fog from landing fields and re-

moval of ice from plane wings are already perfected.

The Plastic Age

Few developments are so spectacular as the progress of the plastics—chemistry's answer to technological unemployment. These latest man-made materials appear in thousands of forms all the way from artistic buttons to husky gears. The accessories of the plastics were celluloid and bakelite. Almost every day a new member of this versatile family is born. One of the most recent products is the permanent playing card which doesn't get dirty, doesn't get torn, and doesn't wear out. Henry Ford and his chemurgic friends are doing real missionary work toward solving the farm problem by transforming old agricultural surpluses into new industrial products.

The glass industry is producing a polarized, or one-way glass, for protection against auto head-light glare, flexible glass for various uses, glass bricks for building, and spun glass for textiles and insulation. Alloy steels are opening up another vast field. Nickel, chromium, copper, manganese, vanadium, titanium, and zirconium are among the materials which, when mixed with iron, produce a lighter, stronger steel. Also in the metal field is talk of "alcaums" which is the aluminum industry's answer to the domination of the container field by tin-plate makers. Colored printing, colored movies, and colored still-photos are rapidly coming. Three miles of "cotton roads" are being built even way up in New Hampshire this summer! Photo-sculpture machines will produce your likeness in three dimensions!

Naturally some of these products will never fulfill present expectations; but others will far exceed even the most visionary promises. It is here that those who are losing their old jobs today should find new jobs tomorrow. It is here also that investors will be tempted to speculate; but I charge you to remember that the old-established companies with strong research organizations are far better for either investments or speculation than new fly-by-night ventures. But to bring these changes about in an orderly and just way, industrial research must be accompanied by a spiritual awakening. Hence, both the laboratories and the churches demand support.

New Deal Cost \$1,250 a Family

More to Come, Says House Minority Leader; Raps Extravagance.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The Roosevelt administration will have spent 32 billion, 675 million dollars by the time this congress adjourns, Bertrand Snell, representative from New York, told the house during the debate on the 803 million dollar tax bill.

"This means that the New Deal will have taken \$1,250 from every family in the United States," he said. "And the money has been spent in a wasteful, extravagant manner," he added.

Ridicules Financial Program.
Citing the mounting deficits, Snell said:

"Three times we have been told in the President's budget messages no new taxes would be required, and in each instance we have been called upon later in the same session to pass a new tax bill.

"All this proves beyond doubt this administration does not have the slightest semblance of a financial program. Its nearest approach to a budget policy is to spend all the money it can gather in or borrow, in as many ways as possible."

Carry Issue to People.
Minority leaders decided to carry to the people at the November elections the issues raised by the President's new "corporation surplus" tax bill.

"It is a question to put squarely before the people," Snell declared.

"If the people decide that thrift in business and saving for a rainy day is bad policy then they can endorse the new taxes by their votes. I am confident that they will conclude otherwise."
