covery or depression is usually re-
sulted. Regarding the quarter-to-
quarter movements, prices in eight of
the past ten instances have closed the
year no lower than at the beginning.
Such conclusions, however, may be
more in the nature of a coincidence
than a fundamental development. Un-
doubtedly business and stock prices
may have been influenced to some ex-
tent particularly in the third quarter
in some election years. It is proba-
bly supposed that the "big show" in
Wall Street and Washington try to
rig prices to make it look as good as
they can for their candidates or as bad
as possible for their opponents. Cer-
tainly, if some unusual situation
should arise whereby one candidate
promised, for instance, to abolish the
profit system whereas the other pled-
ged to adhere to orthodox finance,
stock prices would undoubtedly follow
the election trend very closely and
would be influenced decidedly by its
results.

Avoid Election Year "Averagitis"

It is useless to attempt to draw con-
clusions by averaging the results of
the past ten or twelve election years.
"Averagitis", that well-known disease
contracted by statisticians, is espe-
cially dangerous in this connection.
Some students of the situation believe
that the only value to be gained from
the history of earlier campaigns is to
examine closely those which may par-
allel the present one—the election of
1896, and possibly that of 1912. The
issues involved in these two previous
campaigns, particularly that of 1896,
roughly compare with the present
conflict between further experimen-
tation or orthodox recovery. However,
the trend of business in those years
was entirely different from that of to-
day—1896 was a year of bitter depres-
sion, while 1912 was the end of a pe-
riod of prosperity.

Business at the present time is in
the midst of a vigorous recovery
movement. Activity is 65 per cent
above the depression low but is still 6
per cent below normal. History shows
that no period of recovery in the past
has culminated before the Babson-
chart crossed the X-Y normal line.
In fact, the only real important con-
clusion that can be drawn from a
study of previous election years is that
no campaign, nor change in the party
of the major trend in business or
stock prices from bull to bear or vice
versa.

Bull Market Not Over

On the basis of the above con-
clusions, I believe that the current bull
market which began in July, 1932, is
not yet at its peak. There is, of course
a good chance that stocks will expe-
rience some unsettlement from time to
time as the campaign progresses. Re-
gardless of the outcome, however, the
basic trend should then be resumed.
Furthermore, if business continues to
improve in the next five months as
rapidly as it has in the past year and
a half, political "jitters" will be for-
gotten in the blaze of reports of in-
creased earnings, bigger dividends,
and returning confidence!
