AID TO THE FARMER

At last convinced that Congress is determined to wrest from his hitherto confidential files the names of all recipients of the big A. A. A. benefit checks, and realizing that he is unable to conceal all the facts, Secretary of Agriculture Wallace has finally consented to give to Congress and to the country a full accounting showing where the "big money" went. The Secretary discovered that his letter to the Senate Committee on Agriculture, that cited a few payments, did not satisfy; he saw the Senate intent on having a real showdown. So he reluctantly abandoned his ridiculous alibis and announced that he would produce the record.

The record thus far forced from Wallace contains an imposing array of large A.A.A. checks, but the list is far from complete; it reveals the name of only one big beneficiary. The record thus far available lists the following large checks issued by A.A.A.:

Mrs. Marke's endorsed recipe follows:

- CARROT SOUP**
- 1 young rabbit
 - 3 cups carrots, sliced
 - 2 cups green peas
 - 2 or 3 green onions chopped (tops included)
 - 1 tablespoon flour
 - 1 tablespoon butter
 - 1 teaspoon salt
- Dress a fat young rabbit 9 to 10 weeks old and cut into small pieces. Place in a kettle and cover with boiling water. Add the vegetables and cook gently until tender. (More water may be added if necessary). Blend the flour with the butter stir into the soup and boil for 1 minute. Season with salt and pepper to taste. Serve hot with toasted whole wheat bread.

Washington Cty. Breeder Wins National Recognition

Peterborough, N. H., June 19—A Washington county Guernsey breeder, F. H. Stangel of Sherwood, Oregon, has just won national recognition on his pure bred Guernsey bull Escalon Fairy's King 89399.

This bull, having two daughters which have made creditable official records, has been entered in the Advanced Register of the American Guernsey Cattle Club. Escalon Fairy's King will be known hereafter as an Advanced Register sire. Only Guernseys which meet high production requirements are eligible for entry. The two daughters which have completed official records are Shamrock Flower 249754 producing 105213 pounds of milk, and 473.4 pounds of fat in class AAA, and Shamrock Francie 314999 producing 130063 pounds of milk and 568.1 pounds of fat in class A.

"In God We Trust"

The inscription "In God We Trust" was placed on our coinage at the suggestion of Salmon P. Chase, secretary of the treasury, in the Lincoln administration. The inscription first appeared on the pattern coins of 1863 and was adopted for use on the two-cent piece, the issuance of which began in 1864. It was used on other coins beginning in 1866. The omission of the inscription from the first of the St. Gauden's design \$10 and \$20 gold coins of 1907 occasioned so much unfavorable comment that it was quickly restored and consequently these coins of that date are obtainable with and without the inscription.

Rosicrucians Attend District Conclave

All Rosicrucians within a fifty-mile area will attend a series of addresses to be given by Cecil A. Poole, K. R. C., member of the National Board of Lecturership of the Rosicrucian Order, AMORC, beginning Saturday, June 27, Sunday, June 28, Monday, June 29 at W. of Woodcraft Hall, 1410 S. W. Morrison, Portland.

Alfred Richard of Aloha, local Rosicrucian, states that these conclaves are traditional with the Order. It is declared that during the reign of Amenhotep IV, Pharaoh of Egypt, 1350 B. C., the period in which the philosophical Order is traditionally asserted to have had its origin, Rosicrucians began to periodically meet in grotto temples. These secret meetings were for discussion and contemplation of the then advanced knowledge of the time. Treks to these early conclaves were over the desert waste lands of Northern Africa.
