coming winter has already moved up another notch.

RAILROADS WILL SUFFER
Frankly, I am not yet alarmed by the effect of this drought on the long-pull business outlook for the entire country even though certain territories will be hit very badly. The government is pouring funds into the dry belt to relieve distress just as fast as it can. Retail sales have already dropped sharply. The railroads in afflicted regions will feel the blow terribly. They will lose this year's grain traffic and there will be no "drought" benefits for them. Farm implement houses will see a serious drop in their sales in the stricken sections. Hence stock and commodity markets will follow conditions very closely.

It is now impossible to say how this drought will affect the vote on November Third. The Administration will receive credit for rushing relief into the stricken regions. Yet the Republicans will lose no opportunity in recalling the New Deal's policy of plowing under crops and slaughtering livestock. They will point out how absolutely superficial any agricultural program of this sort is in the face of nature's forces. Personally I feel that the AAA money could have been better spent. Some of it would have done far more lasting good if it had been used to develop a scientific method of giving warning of such terrific catastrophes as last Spring's floods and this current drought!

Business, as estimated by the Babsonchart, is only 4 per cent below normal and is now 17 per cent above a year ago.
