Thfts Reports to Sheriff's Office

Mrs. Raleigh Whitmore of Hillsboro route 2, reports the theft of a diamond ring, value about \$100 a man's gold Elgin watch, a lady's yellow Elgin watch, yellow gold ring mounting, gold lavalliere and chain with brown mixed agate pendant. Mrs. Norlen was sent to St. Vincent's hospital and Mrs. Munden received slight injuries.

Bert Laney, of Glencullen, received cuts about the head and an injured back while riding as a passenger with Frank E. McCafferty of 1514 N. E. 30th Ave., Portland, 3 miles west of Tigard at Roamers Rest Park, when the car was struck by a car driven by William Harwick of Comstock Annex Apts. McCafferty in his report states that he was turning into the park when the Harwick car struck his right rear fender.

Charles Dotson Back In County Jail After Break

John Doe Warrant Issued for Woman Alleged to have Furnished Guns

Charles A. Dotson, 26, of Portland, one of two prisoners who broke jail at Hillsboro Tuesday night, was arrested in a farm house two miles east of Sandy Wednesday night by State Police Wescott, Washington County Deputies Johnson and Bush and Portland Detectives McMeeken and Peterson.

With him was taken Anette Edmond, 26, and Daniel Gault, Portland, who allegedly assisted him in his escape.

Leslie H. Stairet, 42, of Seattle, the other prisoner who escaped, was still at large Thursday night the officers said.

The two criminals fled about 9 p. m. after threatening Grant Zumwalt, jailer, with a revolver. The jailer was relieved of the keys to the prison and then he and Charles Merrill of Portland, were locked in a storeroom while the two prisoners made their way to freedom.

It is believed that a woman was an accomplice in the break, as an unidentified blonde, thought to be Dotson's sweetheart, was named in a Jane Doe warrant issued at the request of Sheriff John W. Connell, charging the woman with aiding a jailbreak. She is believed to have supplied the two fugitives with revolvers as she twice visited Dotson during the day of the break.

A young son of the jailer is reported to have overheard a conversation between the blonde and Dotson in which she allegedly said: "The car is parked around the corner, near a hydrant."

Dotson had three other visitors recently according to Zumwalt. His mother and step father and a brother visited him last Friday. Stairet has had no recent visitors.

Dotson, who has been held since July 17, awaiting trial on a forgery charge, appeared to be the leader as he requested permission to phone his mother and brother in Portland. After he had finished his call he whistled and Zumwalt found himself facing a revolver. After locking the jailer and Merrill in the storeroom he released Stairet and the two effected the escape.

Stairet last week pleaded guilty to obtaining money under false pretenses. Dick Busch, Deputy Sheriff, suffered a cracked breast bone and a severe cut on the chin from a fall while surrounding the house at Sandy.

Annual Report Shows Increase In School Funds

Surplus Cash Balances Given by O. B. Kraus Reveals a Increase of \$19,947.80

An increase of \$19,947.80 has been registered in cash balances during the school year, according to the annual report of O. B. Kraus, County school superintendent released Saturday. Debt reduction shows a total of \$50,391.54 represented by \$38,491.54 in outstanding warrants and \$611,900 in bond obligations.

The report also shows that 7 districts formerly on a cash basis now have outstanding obligations led by a \$20,000 issue by Tigard Union High District. Relief projects have resulted in total capital outlays being increased to \$53,223.53 as compared to \$13,238.68 in 1935.

The county's 104 elementary and five union high districts this year reported total receipts of \$598,164.18 with disbursements of \$621,802.20. A comparison shows that last year receipts totaled \$566,695.16 and disbursements were \$585,119.26. Assessed valuation for the year was set at \$24,534,926.26.

The report also disclosed that in some cases this year tax income was greater than amounts levied, due it was explained to heavy collection of delinquent assessments.

School Boards Invited to Gaston Meet Tonight

Members of Nine School Boards of the vicinity of Gaston have been invited to attend a meeting to be held at the Gaston School House Friday, August 7 at 8 p. m. for the purpose of discussing school problems relating to health, according to Mrs. L. H. Logan, County Nurse.

The purpose is to stimulate interest in creating more healthful surroundings for school children and encourage calm discussion at a time when no given disease is prevalent. Other topics to be discussed include: The Present School Law; What Do "Kid Diseases" Amount to Anyway; Transportation of Children who Become Ill at School; School Yard First Aid; Play Equipment and Play Supervision; Sanitation; Water Supplies; Toilets; Hand Washing Tuberculosis Tests and Immunization.

Depending on this call and requests from other sections of the county, similar meetings will be held in other groups throughout the County, further states Mrs. Logan.

Poultry Convention Slated August 25th at Corvallis

The turkey breeders, growing and hatcherymen of Oregon will hold an annual convention at the Oregon State College at Corvallis, Tuesday, August 25, according to L. E. Francis, assistant county agent. The word of this convention, which is the first of its kind to be held, has just been received from H. E. Cosby, extension poultryman and head of the poultry department, who will be in charge of the meeting.

The meeting has been scheduled as a result of numerous requests from leaders in the poultry industry. The turkey industry has made a rapid growth in recent years and it was felt by these leaders that a statewide convention for the purpose of discussing the many problems which are common to all would be beneficial to the group.

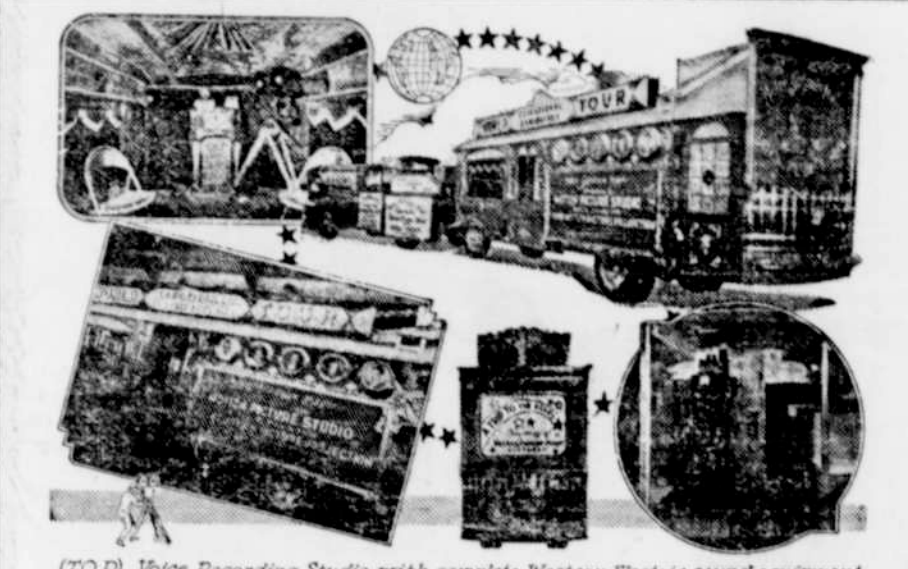

Traveling Motion Picture Studio Coming

Motion Picture Studio Due in Beaverton Saturday Morning

Through the influence of S. D. Meyers, manager of the Ritz Theatre, Beaverton, arrangements were made today to have an elaborate Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer Traveling Motion Picture Studio visit Beaverton on its extensive goodwill exhibition tour of the world.

The lavishly equipped studio on wheels, constructed by the great motion picture company at a staggering cost of \$150,000, is scheduled to arrive here next Saturday, and according to present plans will be open for public inspection from 11 a. m. until 12 o'clock in front of the Ritz Theatre, Beaverton, the home here of Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer Pictures.

The studio, which has traveled across the continent from the famous M-G-M studios at Culver City, California, has about it more than \$60,000 worth of costly and intricate sound motion picture recording and projection equipment. It is a completely equipped Hollywood studio on wheels.

A Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer director, and a complete staff of camera, soundmen, electricians, and movie makeup experts compose the personnel of the outfit, but motion pictures will not be filmed in this city during its visit.

Its brief stop-over here is being regarded purely as one to permit film fans of this city to inspect the magnificent outfit, to learn how talking pictures are filmed and recorded and projected and the motion picture technicians with the studio will be available to answer questions regarding their work while the studio is here, it is said.

During the period the studio is open for inspection, the general public will be permitted to enter the studio. They will be escorted through by the motion picture men, and the operation of the sound recording room in one section of the 65-foot outfit, and the sound projection room in the rear compartment of the studio, will be explained in detail.

The studio is hauled by a giant trackless locomotive equipped with powerful special built Waukesha motors, and this tremendous engine is in itself an outstanding sight. Special built camera, pilot and advance cars make up the remainder of the Hollywood caravan visiting this city with the studio.

Railroad Business Looking Better Says Babson

Reports Increase of Traffic Definitely Encouraging To Companies

Babson Park, Mass., Aug. 7.—When all is said and done the volume of traffic determines whether the railroads will operate in red or black ink. For the first time since recovery set in, the rails are showing definite signs of getting back on their feet. The carriers may never return the dividends of other years and railroad securities may not be the soundest investments for the baby's bank. However, great profits may be made in certain rails before we reach the end of this recovery period. CARLOADINGS ON UP-GRADE

A glance at the railroad statistics of the past few years shows the terrific toll which the depression took of this industry. The story is told best by tabulating the average weekly carloadings for the whole country as well as the gross revenues and earnings per share of a typical carrier such as the New York Central.

After trailing the improvement in most other industries for the past three years, the railroads are now beginning to take their place in the recovery parade. At present carloadings are running about 25 to 30 percent above this same period of a year ago. Moreover, the weekly figure will soon be higher than the total for any seven-day period since the Fall of 1930.
