Washington County boys and girls 4-H clubs, Future Farmers, Grangers, Farmers Unions and inventors and manufacturers, are engaged in preparing their displays for the Washington County Fair to be held in Shute Park, Hillsboro, September 3, 4, and 5. Splendid crop conditions in the County will make the exhibits of grains, vegetables, nuts and berries an outstanding feature.

The leading civic clubs of the County are getting ready for extensive entertainment programs. Free exhibit space is being given to Washington County inventors and manufacturers. Following the custom established several years ago there will be no admission charge to the fair grounds.

It is planned to have all the business concerns close from 1:30 to 3:30 Friday afternoon to allow employers and their employees to visit the fair.

Free Tonsil Clinic Open at Hillsboro August 10-15

The free tonsil clinic conducted annually by Smith's hospital at Hillsboro will be operated during the weeks of August 10-15. The clinic is for the benefit of children whose parents are financially unable to pay the regular doctors fee for this service. There is no charge for the physicians time, the only charge being the actual hospital expense for the patient.

Those desiring to take advantage of this free clinic are asked to make arrangements in advance.

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INSURED LOAN UP TO \$2000 AVAILABLE UNDER MODERNIZATION CREDIT PLAN

Insured loans for the improvement of homes and business properties have been used extensively throughout Washington county, according to figures released by the Federal Housing Administration. Up to the end of May there had been a total of 386 transactions involving the use of modernization credit in Washington county. These loans had an aggregate dollar volume of \$143,973, giving Washington ninth place among Oregon counties in amount of credit used for property improvement. And it is estimated that an additional \$750,000 has been expended in cash and uninsured loans for similar improvements as a direct result of the Federal Housing program.

Only two Oregon counties of smaller population than Washington have used a larger amount of insured credit. They are Clatsop and Umatilla.

The volume of insured credit at the end of May was in excess of \$100,000 in each of 14 Oregon counties, the amounts ranging from \$101,036 in Polk to \$2,267,000 in Multnomah. The totals for the entire state at the end of May was \$5,515,659.

Loans for the improvement of homes, business establishments and farm properties are available under the Modernization Credit plan in amounts up to \$2,000. The credit may be used for repairs, additions, modernization and for the installation of water, heating and lighting systems. The loans are repaid in equal monthly installments over periods as long as three years.

The modernization credit phase of the Federal Housing program will continue in operation until next April. The insured mortgage system, under which credit is made available for building, buying and refinancing homes, is a permanent feature of the program.

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
