idea of what to expect in the next
year or two by reviewing the changes
in the various cost of living items
since farm prices first started their
upward jaunt in the early days of the
New Deal.

PLAN TO BUILD

While food has been the outstanding
performer, rents have also made sub-
stantial gains—at much as 20 per cent
in some localities. There is a big
theoretical shortage in homes. Even
with the sharp improvement in build-
ing since 1933, the normal new and re-
placement demand for residences is
not being met. The shortage of homes
which has accumulated during the
depression amounts to nearly a mil-
lion. Hence rents have every reason
to continue on to higher levels. With
land values on the upgrade and the
Federal Housing Administration offer-
ing attractive financing terms, the
wise renter is either signing a long
lease or making plans to build in the
near future.

Clothing is in the same position as
housing from the cost standpoint.
Although there is promise of a good
crop this year, raw cotton prices are
holding firm. Inventories of finished
goods are the lowest in years. Mean-
while retail trade is excellent and
stocks are turning over rapidly. Ret-
ail clothing prices had a very sharp
rise—25 to 30 per cent—soon after the
announcement of the NRA but have
been practically unchanged during the
past two years. The long-pull out-
look, however, is for definitely higher
prices. I believe readers will be pay-
ing more for suits and dresses next
Spring than they are now.

TODAY'S DANGER

In many cases home furnishings are
selling 20 to 25 per cent higher than in
1933. Their advance is not over.
Raw materials are working upward.
Labor costs are bound to increase.
Furniture demand is the best in years.
I see nothing to be gained by waiting
to purchase furniture and the like now
if you have the cash. Do not, how-
ever, buy small items on "easy pay-
ment" terms. You pay too big a
premium for the accommodation. Buy-
ing a home on a long-term "instal-
ment" mortgage is sound, but on small
purchases the "loading charge" is out
of line due to bookkeeping overhead.

The Administration's monetary and
agricultural policy has been aimed to
bring about higher prices—a return to
the 1926 level with a hope of helping
business. Rising prices do stimulate
business provided that maladjustments
do not occur. For instance, if the city
worker's food bills are doubled, and
are not offset by increases in his pay
envelope, he is forced to cut his buying
of other goods. Then recovery falters.
This is the real danger today:

TOO sharp a rise in food costs. As a
hedge—stock up now with as many
staples as you can buy. If you have
a garden, revive the old war-time
practice of "putting down" a good
line of vegetables and preserves for
the coming winter.

Jelly of the Week

—BY ALICE BLAKE—



Crab Apple Jelly

6 cups (3 lbs.) juice
7 cups (3 lbs.) sugar
1 box powdered fruit pectin

To prepare juice, remove blossom
and stem ends from about 5 pounds
fully ripe crab apples and cut ap-
ples in small pieces. Do not peel or
core. Add 3 cups water, bring to a
boil and simmer, covered, 15
minutes. Crush with masher and
simmer, covered, 5 minutes longer.
Place fruit in jelly cloth or bag and
squeeze out juice. (If there is a
slight shortage of juice, add small
amount of water to pulp in jelly
cloth and squeeze again.)

Measure sugar into dry dish and
set aside until needed. Measure
juice into a 5- to 6-quart saucepan
and place over hottest fire. Add
powdered fruit pectin, mix well,
and continue stirring until mixture
comes to a hard boil. At once pour
in sugar, stirring constantly. Con-
tinue stirring, bring to a full roll-
ing boil, and boil hard 1/2 minute.
Remove from fire, skim, pour
quickly. Paraffin hot jelly at once.
Makes about 13 glasses (6 fluid
ounces each).
