Salem, Ore., Aug. 21—Frank Tyler, representing the Fidelity Mutual Association and the Consolidated Insurance Underwriters, two unlicensed insurance organizations, both of Minneapolis, Minnesota, was tried in Clatsop county and fined \$50 and costs, and sentenced to 30 days in jail, according to information received by Hugh H.
