Landon Runs Strong In Poll National Tabulation Under Way

Scattered Returns From 23 States Shows Trend

Early Michigan Balloting Indicates Close November Battle Between Roosevelt and Landon

VOTING HERE OPEN TO ALL

New York, August 28—First scattered returns in the Presidential poll, to reach Straw-Vote Headquarters here this week, show Landon highest in the initial tabulation of the nationwide weekly newspapers' poll.

Ballots were received and tabulated from 23 states. But votes in sufficient number to actually be considered indicative of what the final returns may show, were available in only five of these 23 states.

Nevertheless, on all returns from the 23 states, as between the two leading candidates only, the ballots show voters' choices as follows:

Landon 54%

Roosevelt 46%

The 23 states from which first scattered ballots were received here for national tabulation are:

California, Connecticut, Florida, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, New Jersey, New York, North Dakota, Ohio, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Texas, Vermont, Washington and West Virginia.

Bearing out early surmises of political observers that support of the Union party candidate, Lemke; would come from the small towns and rural America, the tabulations of first total returns from the same 23 states, discloses division of choices in this manner:

Landon 50.9%

Roosevelt 43.5%

Lemke 3.4%

Thomas 0.3%

Colvin 0.3%

Browder 0.6%

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Winery Locates At Hillsboro

Tualatin Valley Winery, located at Hillsboro is under way to become one of the largest in the State of Oregon, announces Louis Herbold, owner. The capacity of the plant is now being increased to 85,000 gallons and to take care of this, new equipment is being installed.

J. W. Flemming of Lodi and H. C. Bettinger of Berkeley, California, will be associated with Mr. Herbold; Mr. Flemming will have complete charge of the wine making. Previous to his coming to Oregon was associated with the Shewan-Jones Company. Mr. Bettinger will be sales manager having complete charge of the sales department.

"The plant is so arranged that next year we will use not only grapes but berries and some peaches; gallonage will probably be increased to 100,000 to handle all of Washington county surplus," further announced Mr. Herbold. "Grapes and berries that hang on the vines for want of a market will be turned into cash for the farmer and also employment will be increased."

Mrs. H. H. Stannard Does Fine Piece of Work Depicting Early Pioneer Days

A pageant depicting early pioneer days of Washington County written by Mrs. Maude Stannard, Hillsboro, will be one of the features of the Washington County Fair September 3, 4, 5, Shute Park, Hillsboro; the pageant is being sponsored by the Hillsboro Coffee Club.

Each civic club in the county is responsible for one episode and selection of characters.

The continuity of the pageant will be carried by two characters "Doubt" and "Under a Landing" the former question "Why Pioneer" and the latter brings the answer in prologue. Five episodes and epilogue depict the events in dialogue, pantomime and tableau with appropriate musical settings and back ground.

Outline of the pageant follows: Prologue "The Spirit of Pioneering".

Episode 1—First settlers of Washington County 1839-1840.

Episode 2—"Star of Oregon" the period of 1841.

Episode 3—"Emanuel" including from 1842 to 1844.

Episode 4—"Commencement" the period of 1849.

Episode 5—"First County Fair" during 1854.

Republican Meeting at Hillsboro Next Wednesday Evening

Washington County Republicans interested in the coming campaign will meet next Wednesday for the purpose of conferring with officials of the state Republican Committee who will address the group and outline the plan of organization as well as give the salient features in regard to the coming campaign.

County precinct committeemen and committee women are requested to be present as well as all members of the Young Republican club and the Veterans' Landon-Knox club. The meeting will begin at 8 p. m. according to the announcement made by Donald Templeton, the County Chairman, who promises an interesting meeting.

Lemke Wins Third Party Nomination

William Lemke, North Dakota, Congressman, was nominated for President, and Thomas C. O'Brien of Massachusetts, as vice-president, at a meeting of Independent electors Wednesday night in the Hillsboro Grange Hall. Other offices filled were five electors which included Frank Saafield, Joseph Schomus, Gervais, Eban Ray, William, Frank C. Fluke, Beaverton and George W. Thiessen of Oregon City. With the exception of the office of United States Senator all other state offices were passed.

After all nominations had been made, Peter Zimmerman of Yamhill County, nominated Albert Streiff of Washington County for United States Senator, declaring that Streiff for his work in organizing the meeting was deserving of the nomination.

The meeting followed the address of E. E. Kennedy, National Secretary of the Farmers Union and very little time was lost in placing G. W. Theis sen, Oregon City, as chairman, and J. Henry Jacobsen, Hillsboro, secretary and the naming of the nominating committee which included Albert Streiff, Washington County, Mrs. Anna Hughes, Clackamas County, Peter Zimmerman, Yamhill, Frank C. Fluke, Washington, and H. G. Nelville, Clackamas County.

While the nominating committee was in session the Lemke platform was read by the secretary J. Henry Jacobsen and was unanimously adopted.

Streiff nominated Lemke for President, which was seconded by Peter Zimmerman.

An executive committee was elected to fill vacancies, consisting of Albert Streiff, Frank C. Fluke and H. G. Nelville.

Preceding the meeting E. E. Edwards, National Farm Union Secretary, spoke on the plans and program of the Union. Condemned both the major parties and declared that the farmer could expect nothing from either candidate if elected. That in the program of the Union which was promoted in part by Lemke, they knew where he stood, that Roosevelt already had been successful in defeating many of the laws backed by the union, and that no one knew where Landon stood and nobody could find out.
