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BUSINESS PAYS TAX BILL OF GOVERNMENT

"A housewife attempting to make both ends met from her husband's \$20-a-week pay check must disburse \$5 out of that \$20—one fourth of it—for taxes . . . direct and indirect . . . seen and unseen," says a recent survey.

This will probably come as a shock to persons in the small-income brackets—many of whom are laboring under the delusion that they are entirely tax-free, because they pay nothing in direct taxes—but the figures are irrefutable. American corporations pay taxes of more than \$2,000,000,000 a year, in addition to corporate income taxes, which totalled nearly \$500,000,000 in 1933. Wholesalers and retailers of goods are also heavily taxed. And every cent of that tremendous tax bill is, in effect, simply "paid on account" for individuals by the manufacturers and others.

In other words, business pays the bill to government—and then business passes it on to the people by adding to the cost of every commodity and service it sells. Business couldn't do otherwise if it wanted to. It can't raise money out of thin air, or pull greenbacks out of a magician's hat. Every cost of operation—whether it be rent, supplies, wages or taxes—must come out of the pockets of people who buy its products. And the higher taxes soar, the more you must pay. You can't beat the bill you "owe" to the government.

So if you have fallen for the ancient fallacy to the effect that "The rich pay all the taxes and the poor get all the benefits of government free," think again!

BIG POLITICAL DRIVE ABOUT TO GET UNDERWAY

Even as the approach of fall stimulates business, it stimulates politics.

Both parties are preparing for the big drive now. The candidates are limbering up—and during September and October will really go through their paces.

First guns from the Landon camp came with his speeches on education and taxation. The Governor denounced the teachers' oath, spoke for free education. He vigorously denounced the Administration tax and fiscal program and paid special notice to what he termed the "cock-eyed" excess profits tax exacted at the last session of Congress at White House request.

Republican strategy, according to observers, calls for only a few formal speeches by Governor Landon. He will travel about the country and make informal appearances. Many speeches will be made by Colonel Knox, a much more impressive radio speaker.

The Roosevelt campaign has not really gotten underway yet—the President apparently feels that it would be a waste of energy for him to do a great deal before October. His tour of the drought section, however, gave him a chance to be seen and heard. And in the meantime of course, the Democratic machine is working 24 hours a day, bending every effort to bring "doubtful" states into the Roosevelt column.

the 1931 level. So far the railroads have been laggards in this recovery period. The real freight loads, however, come from those heavy industries, such as building and mining, which are just now beginning to get in step. Freight gains, in turn, mean new orders for railway equipment—a vast industry in itself. Machine tool orders, which are almost back to the 1929 level, forecast further recovery in these capital goods lines.

5. RETAIL TRADE: The new Recovery Peak for consumer sales reached during the Summer is the most bullish news of all. Mounting retail sales are felt through all lines and in all communities. In relation to the season's unusually good demand, the nation's inventories of finished goods are at the lowest in years.

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This means that more raw materials and more workers will be necessary during the Fall to keep pace with consumer demand. For instance, replenishment of depleted stocks has already boosted textile activity to the highest level since 1930.

Five Question-Marks

There are, however, several question-marks in the outlook. First, and of most immediate importance, is the drought. Some sections have been hit very hard. Farm experts are not yet certain that the gains in farm income in non-drought areas will offset crop failures in burned-up regions. Another fly in the ointment is our constantly growing Federal deficit. We cannot be out of the woods until our government is balancing its budget. Third, the campaign may also cause some unsettlement before the election is over but it will not alter the basic upward trend.

Then there is fear that the struggle between the Facists and Communists in Spain may touch off a major war. Trans-Atlantic dispatches will be disturbing at times, but no general European war lies immediately ahead. Finally, labor unrest is causing a good deal of anxiety. I doubt very much, if American labor leadership is so short-sighted as to launch a strike in any big industry this Fall. But next year—look out!

Push Sales Now

Weighing the bullish and bearish influences, the scale falls heavily on the side of optimism. Only a lack of spiritual vision is holding our nation back. We are in the midst of a fundamental period of recovery with the business outlook for the coming months bright. From an economist's standpoint, the time to push sales campaigns is in a period of declining business. But from the business executive's angle, the time to drive salesmen, buy more advertising space, and launch direct-mail is when the public is in a buying mood.

Business, according to the Babson.

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chart, is now twenty-five per cent above a year ago, and only one per cent under Normal. Moreover, activity should continue to improve for the next year or two, at least. But do not wait until the peak of enthusiasm is reached to do your expanding. Now, while business is entering a prosperity era and your profit margin is good, is the time to get busy. Depressions have not been outlawed. Good times are not guaranteed to last forever. Hence, it is today's big job for everybody—workers, managers, salesmen—to make hay while the sun shines. But remember that honesty, industry, thrift, and righteousness are still necessary as foundations of lasting prosperity.
