VOTE!!!

The greatest possession of a free people is the ballot—the right to vote. It is a defender of our liberties and a weapon against injustice.

Yet that invaluable heritage is not prized by millions of otherwise good citizens. Proof of this statement can be found in undeniable statistics. In most elections, less than half of the persons who are entitled to vote do so. It is exceptional when an election brings to the voting booths more than fifty per cent of enfranchised citizens.

One result is that public officials are elected by minorities—the vote of the majority is silent. Another, and worse result is a flagging of interest by the people in a thing which vitally affects us all—our government.

This year, there are great issues before us. No matter where we may stand it is our duty as well as our privilege to mark an X opposite names of our choice on the ballot. Only by doing that, can we have popular government.

In Germany the right to vote has been virtually abrogated—at the last election citizens had a choice of endorsing Hitler or of leaving the ballot blank, there being no opponent. That is true of Italy, of Russia, of Greece, of a dozen other powers. And here in America where we still have that right which preserves our freedom, half of us don't trouble to exercise it.

So—vote on November 3. Vote for whoever you believe is the best man for President. Do the same for other offices. It is your inalienable right to vote for whomever you please. And only by voting on the men and issues of the time, can that right be preserved.

RATS COST

\$200,000,000 A YEAR

The average housekeeper of this county may be inclined to dismiss the presence of a few mice in the house, and the average farmer may look upon the rats in his barn as an evil not to be banished but when you think of the enormous loss inflicted upon the people of this country by these rodents it would seem that everybody would do his and her part to drive these pests away.

It is estimated by the U. S. Biological Survey that rats cause an annual loss of \$200,000,000 each year in this country. They do enormous damages in the homes, stores, factories and also ravage the barns on the farms.

According to the authorities who have studied the best ways to prevent this toll temporary measures of rat control include the use of poisons and deadly gases. These devices merely eliminate the animals for a short time and do not prevent others from reinfesting premises. Nevertheless, temporary measures are the first consideration in dealing with the rat problem. Permanent control consists primarily in depriving rats of one or both in their necessities of life—food and shelter.

"Attention to such community rat breeding places as garbage dumps and city abattoirs will keep down the rat population," says the survey in a recent bulletin. "Every community interested in preventing disease epidemics that may possibly be spread by rats should make it a point to provide for proper maintenance of dumps and similar places for garbage and refuse disposals. Changes in the construction of buildings can be effected to make them rat-proof, and building codes can require rat proof construction."

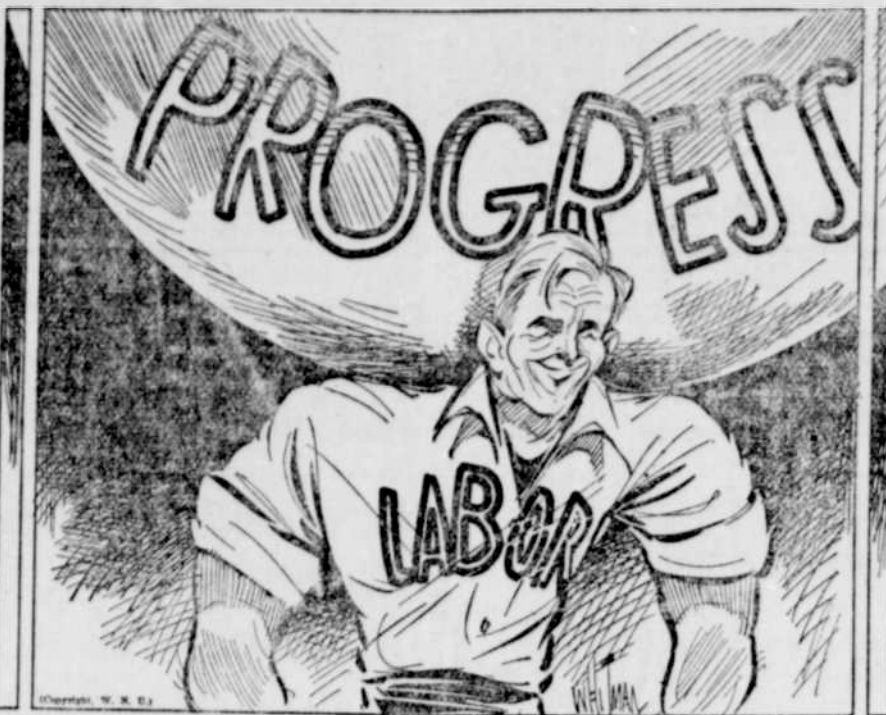

Ex-North Dakotans Oppose Bank Bill

Portland, Ore., Oct. 23—(Special)—Organization of a committee of ex-North Dakota residents to oppose the Oregon State Bank Bill, which will be on the initiative ballot at the general election November 3, was announced today by Bardi G. Skulason, Portland lawyer. The committee is state-wide in scope and has a membership of more than 60 with others enrolling daily.

"Former residents of North Dakota know from bitter experience the failure that inevitably attends experiments in state owned banking," Mr. Skulason said. "They know the institution proposed in the Oregon initiative measure would rapidly become a vehicle of political manipulation and that large losses would be sustained as was the case in North Dakota."

All persons who formerly lived in North Dakota are eligible to join the committee and may do so without obligation, other than that of warning their neighbors and friends of the perils of state banking and may be enrolled by addressing Arthur Foster, executive secretary, 405 Raleigh Building, Portland, Oregon.
