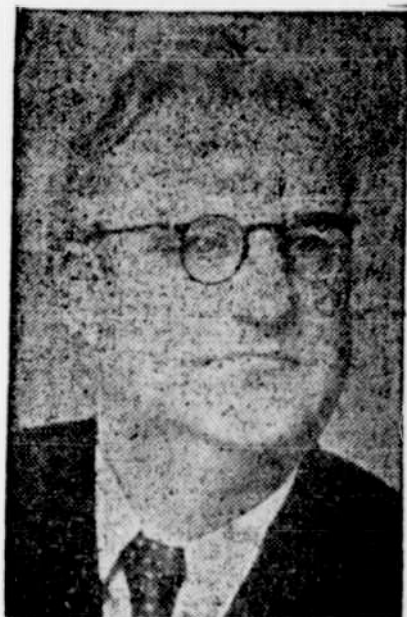
Democrats to Hold Three Closing Rallies in Washington County

NAIL IN LUNG OF CHILD 18 MONTHS SAFELY REMOVED

Three-Year Old Australian Boy Travels 9,000 Miles to Get Relief.

Philadelphia, Pa.—Less than 24 hours after three-year-old Kelvin Rogers arrived here from Australia, a nail that had been lodged in his lung for a year and a half was removed at Temple university hospital in a seven minute operation.

The boy made the 9,000 mile journey with his mother after physicians in his native land had tried twice, without success, to remove the three-inch wire nail he accidentally inhaled.

Operation Delicate One.

The operation was performed in the clinic of Dr. Chevalier Jackson, famed inventor of the perfected bronchoscope. One of his instruments and a biplane fluoroscope were used in the delicate task. The nail was in the lower part of the right lung.

The tiny electric light was used to permit the surgeon to see the inside of the lung, somewhat in the manner of an X-ray, so he could attach small forceps to the nail and remove it.

Surgeons formerly removed foreign bodies from the lungs and bronchial tubes by making incisions. The mortality rate was high. Perfection of the Jackson bronchoscope and the technique for its use have now made the operation bloodless.

Before the operation is performed the position of the foreign object is usually studied by X-ray. Sometimes its position requires a change in the shape of the instrument to be used or a special curve in the tube. All these requirements are studied before the operation is undertaken.

Anesthetic Not Used

Because the patient must breathe through the tube inserted in his throat, a general anesthetic is not given. Narcotics are used to deaden feelings in the throat and decrease respiration.

Then the metal tube is inserted in the mouth. A tiny electric light is lowered into the tube and a special eye piece permits the surgeon to see the object for which he is probing.

Special forceps meet every type of requirement.

The slender forceps are inserted in the tube. With them the surgeon manipulates the object into position and draws it into the mouth of the tube. The bronchoscope is then withdrawn, carrying the object with it.

St. Mary's of the Valley near Beaverton



New \$30,000 Chapel Dedicated at St. Marys

Dedication of the new chapel of St. Mary's of the Valley, near Beaverton, was held last Sunday, October 25, at 3 p. m. His Excellency Most Reverend Archbishop Edward D. Howard officiated.

The new addition in Romanesque style of architecture, is 50 by 101 feet and seats 450 on the main floor. A rear balcony accommodates the choir and pipe organ. The interior has a barrel vault ceiling and the walls are treated with acoustical plaster down to a five-foot oak wainscoat. Stained glass windows from the old chapel were rebuilt and used where possible.

Several new windows were added.

Study was given to decoration with cast plaster ornaments, and to interior color arrangements, to produce a harmonious yet subdued effect. The building has concealed radiation throughout.

The main walls are concrete, and the roof is mission clay tile supported by steel trusses. The face brick exterior matches the main building. Barrett & Logan were the architects.

The community of Sisters of St. Mary of the Valley was founded in Oregon 49 years ago by Archbishop William H. Gross, to provide teachers for his archdiocese. The five foundresses are still active and are anticipating the golden jubilee next year. They are Sister M. Wilhelmina, Sister M. Cecilia, Sister M. Gertrude, Sister

M. Aloyia and Sister M. Rosa. A deserted public school building at Sublimity served as the first chapel, mother house and novitiate. Within a year a small parish school was opened.

The community increased in number and in January, 1891, established its first mission house at Verboort, and assumed charge of St. Mary's home for homeless children. In 1892 a tract of land adjoining the home was secured, a new convent erected and the mother house and novitiate were transferred from Sublimity to St. Mary's.

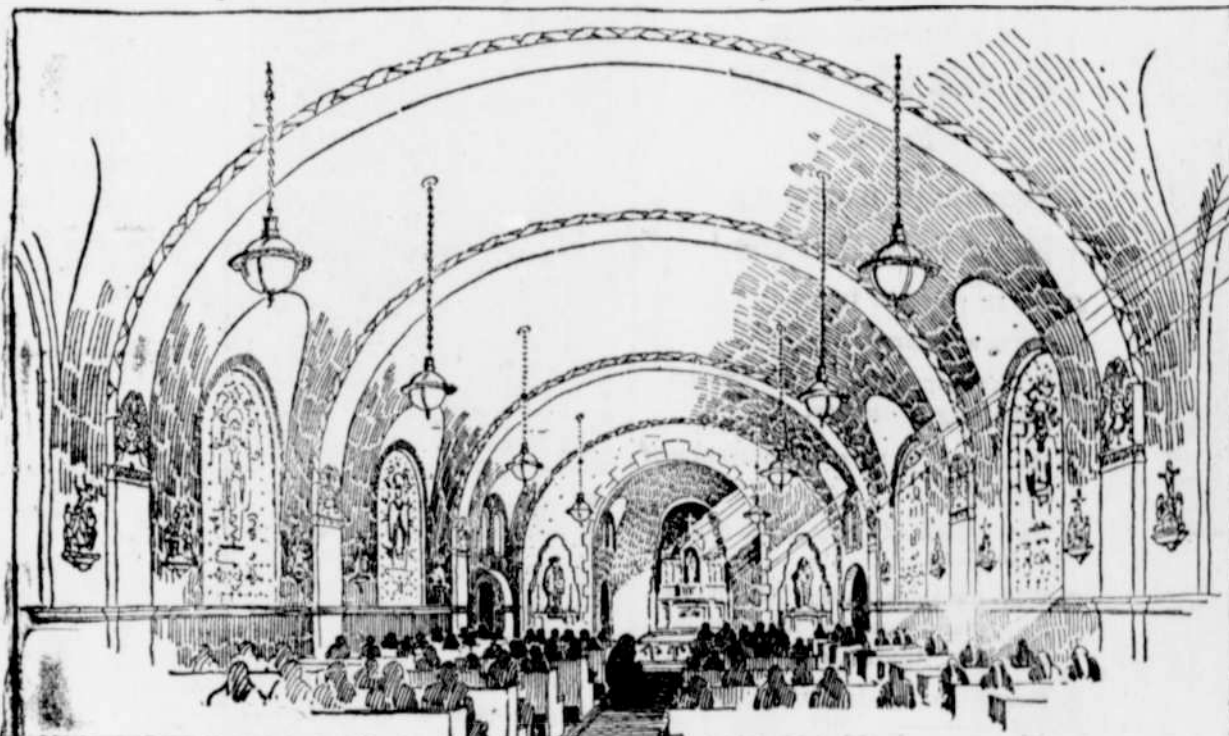
A wing was added in 1902 and St. Mary's Institute, a boarding and day school for girls, was established. In 1905 the convent was enlarged by erection of a chapel and gymnasium.

In 1930 the present 4-story fireproof St. Mary's of the Valley, superseded St.

Mary's Institute. The new building provides quarters for superannuated Sisters, as well as class rooms for training the young nuns and for conducting a boarding school for girls. Membership in the community is almost 200. These Sisters conduct two academies and boarding schools for girls, five high schools including St. Mary's at Huber, 14 parochial schools and St. Mary's Home for Orphans. Total school enrollment last year was 2230.

Plans for building the chapel were abandoned in 1930 when the new boarding school was erected, due to the depression. Meanwhile the Sisters laid aside a building fund, and last February were granted permission by Archbishop Howard to complete their project.

The new chapel is of face brick exterior that matches the main building. There are ten large stained-glass memorial windows and 16 smaller ones. The chapel is of Romanesque style, 50x101 feet. It seats 540 on the main floor. The rear has a balcony which accommodates a new pipe organ and a choir.
