

Police Pension Bill Before Voters Next Tuesday, Nov. 3rd

The entire east side of Portland, which domiciles more than 75 per cent of the city's population, has less than 30 per cent of the available police protection. Of the entire 346 men on the force, only 103 patrolmen, divided into three, eight-hour shifts, are assigned to the east side, which includes all territory from St. Johns to the Clackamas County line on the south.

The west side business district has by far the greater amount of police protection. Patrolmen cover a beat of about a mile square while the great fan which constitutes the east side has officers who cover beats which will average more than six square miles.

Portland has less policemen per capita and pays a smaller wage than any other major Pacific Coast city, including Seattle, San Francisco, Oakland, and Los Angeles. Portland's policemen are also much older than their fellow officers of other cities.

Portland's average age for policemen is 50 years. Many are 60 years of age and past.

In order to correct the many exist-

ing evils now confronting the police department, the charter amendment would reduce the pension for policemen and at the same time permit the recruiting of many young and more active men who would replace a long list of oldsters who would be required to retire immediately.

Pensions would be reduced from \$93 a month to \$75, and police would contribute 4 per cent of their salaries to the fund instead of 1 1/2 per cent, an increase of over 300%.

The pension proposal provides that taxpayers contribute not in excess of six-tenths of one mill annually to the pension fund. This indicates an average cost of between 60 cents and 70 cents per year for the average home owner.

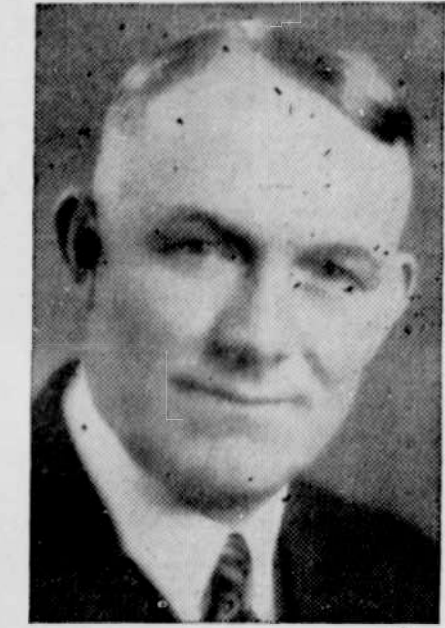

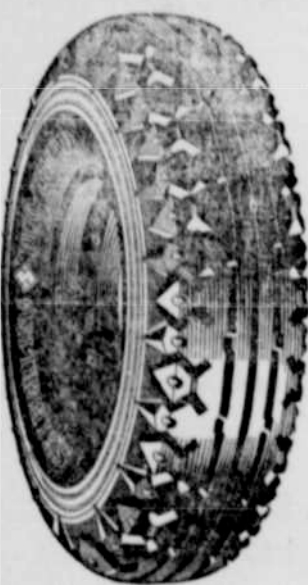

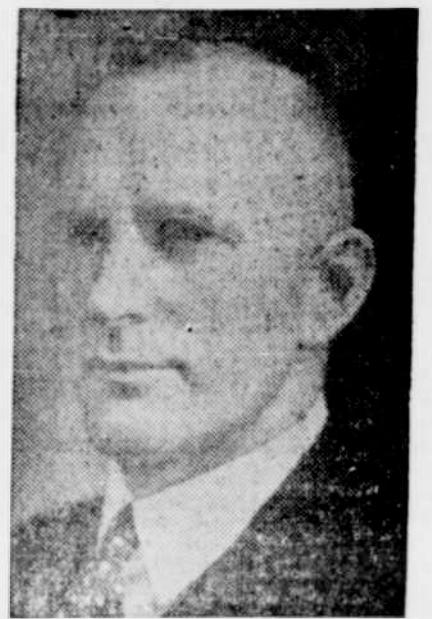

**LIMIT TAXES
ON HOMES & FARMS**

AMENDMENT LIMITING AND REDUCING PERMISSIBLE TAXES ON "TANGIBLE PROPERTY"—Purpose: Constitutional amendment to limit and reduce the total per cent of assessed and equated personal property taxable in 1937 to 6 mills (one cent) on real and tangible personal property, reducing such limit to one cent on real and tangible personal property in 1941 and thereafter; limiting county per cent of assessed and equated personal property taxable in 1937 to 4 mills (one cent) on real and tangible personal property, reducing such limit to one mill (one-tenth of a cent) on real and tangible personal property in 1941 and thereafter; People may vote on this amendment at the next election. Shall be enacted one-half vote each vote at time passed.
