money and administer the job itself. This tax will be increased by one per cent next year, and another one per cent in 1938, reaching a maximum of 3 per cent of all payrolls, to be paid entirely by employers.

That is one phase of the social security act. The employment phase. The other phases have to do with old age insurance.

The tax for this starts on January first and will amount to 2 per cent of all payrolls. Half of this will be paid by employers, and the other half by employees. (Maximum taxable income of an individual is \$50 per week.) This tax will rise slowly, and reach a top of 6 per cent in 1949, 3 per cent of which will be paid by employers and 3 per cent by workers. All of this money will be retained by the Federal government, and will be used to retire workers at the age of 65.

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have turned from the policies of the Republican party of the 20's to the New Deal policies of the 30's. Not Question of Principle

This does not mean that a man should sell his principles for a mess of pottage. A druggist has no excuse to bootleg liquor to make money simply because people temporarily want liquor. There are broad fundamental principles on which we shall courageously stand even if our pocket-books suffer thereby. Yet an impartial analysis of the Democratic program shows that many of the hard-fought problems are not questions of principle but rather questions of policy. For example, the real fight is not so much as to whether or not the government shall spend but what group shall benefit from such expenditures.

There is no sense in arguing with a tidal wave. Money is pouring up with a rush. Financial publications are crisscrossed daily with notices of dividend boosts or year-end extras. Corporations not only are distributing dividends to their stockholders, but are voting bonuses and pay increases for their employees. There are over a million more jobholders today than a year ago, while payrolls are 5 to 10 per cent higher. The average farm community's income is today 10 to 15 per cent above last November. All in all, purchasing power this autumn is at a new high since 1929.

Shop Early This Year

The stream of dollars coming out of hiding brought about a tremendous improvement in public sentiment. Two years ago only the best informed people realized that business was on the upgrade. A year ago it was obvious to everybody that we were rapidly gaining ground. Today it is apparent that we are nearing a prosperity era. There are still several millions of unemployed but I believe that number is far less than popularly supposed. Outside of this problem, the road is fairly clear ahead. I believe that the Roosevelt reelection symbolizes the great change in public viewpoint.

During this coming Christmas season this new attitude will be expressed in terms of real boom buying. "Shop early" is my advice to both men and women. "Carry a complete and heavy line of stock and ad-
