New Suits Filed this week

Two suits for damage claimed sustained amounting to \$30,796.62 were filed Wednesday by Ralph Kemper against Phillip Gruber.

One suit asks for \$175 for damages claimed sustained to plaintiff's coupe and the other for \$30,000 general damages, \$125 for loss of time and \$195.62 for medical treatment as a result of an accident November 11 on the Center-ville road.

Plaintiff alleges that Gruber drove his car on the wrong side of the road and struck his car causing him to be thrown against the coupe and causing him to suffer bruises, lacerations, face crushed and driven backward, and also a shock to the nervous system.

A grand jury session will open on Thursday announces G. Russell Morgan, District Attorney, and the regular jury panel has been called to convene Monday morning.

Numerous criminal cases will be up for consideration according to trial calendar disclosed by R. Frank Peters, Circuit Judge.

Sentencing of Peter Knight, 29, Banks, and William S. Atkins, Hillsboro who pleaded guilty to larceny and receiving stolen property respectively in theft of walnuts from a Geo. Withycombe, a Gaston farmer, is scheduled for Monday.

Trial of Chris Anderson and Earl Larsen, both of Hillsboro, on larceny charges, is set for January 11; Melvin Meek of North Plains, accused of reckless driving, is scheduled to stand trial on January 13; Thorald Bagley of Forest Grove, charged with drunken driving will be tried on the 15th.

The grand jury will consider a charge of larceny against Earl Murray, recently returned from Colorado; face prosecution in the same theft case to which Knight and Atkins have pleaded guilty. Murray has waived preliminary hearing when arraigned before Donald T. Templeton, County Judge.

Archie Beck of Gaston, is also to appear before the grand jury on an investigation of burglary not in a dwelling.

Aviation- "The Industry of the Year"

Babson Park, Mass., Jan. 8.—Early each January I try to select for my own satisfaction one particular industry which I believe has an excellent outlook. Last year I nominated building. Up until a few days ago I was prepared to vote for it again. However, in spite of recent unfavorable accident publicity, certain figures have been released which have shifted my preference to aviation.

RAILS VS AVIATION

In a recent review while summarizing the 1937 outlook for transportation securities, I said: "Rails may be a feature marketwise, but airline issues offer better long-pull possibilities." My fundamental position on railroads for the past four years has been that the coming era of prosperity may be the last opportunity to get rid of rail stocks. They have a high leverage factor and some may show sharp advances in the next few years. Eventually, however, a big portion of present railroad mileage must be scrapped. Labor, taxes, and equipment replacement will skim what cream is left after the airlines steal the high-paying and preferable traffic. That is why I favor aviation in the transportation field.

There are three separate aspects of the aviation business: (1) transport, (2) express, and (3) manufacturing. All have enjoyed tremendous growth, particularly in the last two or three years. They are monthly registering new peaks in volume of business. Figures released recently show that not even the coming of stormy weather and unfortunate accidents have been able to halt the month-to-month gains in passenger miles flown. This is the first winter that passenger business has actually shown increases at this season. At the same time, airplane manufacturers have orders to keep their plants running at capacity for months in advance. The air express division has also made startling progress in recent months.

Three Big Improvements

There are a few stand-out reasons for aviation's growth. First and foremost, there is the steady extension of the airways network. Each year, more localities can be reached by passengers and express direct by air with a minimum of rail and truck transferring. Second, air speeds are being increased. Present time-tables, for example, offer over-night coast-to-coast service. There is likewise steady progress in dependability. The average reader may not realize that a passenger in a plane is twice as safe statistically as a motorist. Third, with growth of traffic, rates are being reduced. Current fares and charges are now about a third of those prevailing a few years ago. A coast-to-coast package, for instance, goes for about \$1 per pound; while a passenger fare from New York to Los Angeles is only \$160.

Anyone who has spent over three days crossing the country recently on crack trains and then returned overnight on a first-class airliner realizes that eventually long-haul passenger business on the "clinkers" is doomed. The same person who studies the cost of sending heavy freight from San Francisco to Boston by rail vs. air knows that long-haul heavy air express has a long way to go to compete with the rails. Also, the air trip for short hauls is at a disadvantage over train travel unless time is very precious. Short city-to-city air travel awaits lower rates and more convenient landing fields. Nevertheless, I am very optimistic on the prospects of the passenger as well as the air express division over the next few years.

FLIVVER PLANES NEXT STEP

The manufacturing end of industry, of course, will mirror the gains in the transport division. So far constant improvements of models has hurt makers' profits because of the excessive retooling costs. Research expenses are currently running as high as \$11,000,000. Eventually, however, experimental days will be over. Then the aircraft builders should be able to break back and let their cash registers add up the profits. World unrest should continue to give them a huge volume of military orders. Also, if the \$1,500 "flivver" plane now being built in Lincoln, Nebraska, can be made foolproof and the price cut in half, manufacturers need not worry about volume. Young America would take to a "roadster" plane just as fast as they took to the "roadster" automobile.

As I look at it, commercial aviation is going through the "awkward age."

New Health Unit Quarters
Ready at Court House

Changes are being made this week on the second floor of the Court House to accommodate the new Health Unit. An exchange of offices of the Road department and those formerly occupied by the County Nurse and Juvenile officer will be made in order to facilitate the work of the Unit.

Dr. D. C. McDonald of Portland, and formerly House Surgeon of St. Vincent's Hospital has accepted a contract with the County for the work of the physician, associated with him will be Miss Clara Engstrom, also of Portland, who will serve as county nurse.

Arthur Tupper assumed the office of Clerk Monday morning and associated with him is Edward C. Luce, who steps down to Deputy Clerk, Mrs. Z. M. Hiatt, Elaine Caldwell, Ophelia Wiesner and James H. Davis, former County Recorder.

This year the duties of the Recorder become the responsibility of the Clerk and abolishing the county recorder by merging the two offices.

James H. Davies will become recording clerk and have charge of the photographic equipment for the recording of legal papers, this eliminates the copying by typewriters.

An additional deputy to have charge of night patrol duty is added under the direction of Sheriff Connell.

Ben Cornelius, who has been serving as deputy sheriff during the absence of Deputy Harry Johnson, has been permanently assigned to night duty; the other two deputies will alternate on the night making a two-man patrol, states Sheriff Connell.

Eighth Grade examinations throughout the schools in Washington county have been announced for Monday, January 25, by O. B. Krause, County School Superintendent. This is the first semester test and examinations will be had for the subjects of Arithmetic, Civic Government, Language History and Spelling.

Legislative Session Opens Next Monday

Portland, Or., Jan. 7.—The thirty-ninth biennial session of the Oregon legislature will convene Monday with many issues of importance up for decision.

Aside from the purely political problems, such as who will control the lower house, which appears to be headed toward settlement with Harry D. Boivin, democrat and Klamath Falls attorney in the lead; and the senate which seems to be safely under the gavel of Frank M. Franciscovich, reports are that state finances and labor laws will take up much of the session.

One much discussed matter is re-division of state highway funds with cities and counties both seeking a larger share. Salaries of state employees will be a major issue. The present salary reduction law enacted two years ago, expires in March. School teachers are asking for a retirement fund, and help for fire-stricken Bandon.

Hood River plans to go before the assembly with legislation planned to prevent strikes. Laborites, armed with a recent supreme court decision that they can picket "peacefully" regardless of whether or not there is an issue between the employer and employees, may ask that state police and national guardsmen be kept out of labor controversies. Another proposal heard is that the state control hiring halls, this control factor being one of the major impediments to maritime peace.

Among other matters gaining attention will be a fight against the Oregon milk control board by interests opposed to the price fixing power of that board; "prepaid medicine" opposed by the medical society; and jury selections, opposed by lawyers.

A number of bills will be aimed at receipts from horse and dog racing. Among these is a bill to end legalized racing; a bill to appropriate the first \$35,000 of receipts to the state fair; a bill to appropriate \$5000 of such receipts for the Lakeview rodeo; one to provide \$1500 for a central Oregon potato show; another for \$5000 to the Portland Rose Festival.

The proposed Wilsonville cut-off, putting Salem and Portland four miles closer; the water level highway up the Columbia river gorge from Portland to The Dalles, are among other matters before the law-makers.

Final plans and awards have been announced by the group in charge. Exhibits will consist of 40 potatoes. Any variety may be shown. The classes for the farmers exhibit will not be determined until all of the exhibits are at the show. At that time any variety of potatoes of which there are sufficient entries to make a special class will be grouped separately. The remaining varieties will be exhibited in miscellaneous division. The Sherwood merchants have provided merchandise awards for the winners in the farmers' division of the show.

Saturday at 1:30 p. m. W. F. Cyrus, county agent, will discuss at an open meeting held in conjunction with the potato show, "The Use of Lime on Washington County Soils".
