The real story is that depreciation
charges are keeping aviation companies
"broke". Eventually, a good por-
tion of what is now being charged to
obsolescence can be used for divi-
dends. The time to buy into an in-
dustry is not in the early stages when
it is being written up in magazines.
Nor should one wait until it is mak-
ing big profits. The time to buy is
during the intermediate period after
the bubble has burst, but before the
dividends are being declared. That is
where aviation seems to be today and
why I nominate it as the 1937 "indus-
try of the year".
