Vote for new grade school building Election Monday from 2 to 7 p. m.

A. \$32,000 which includes payments to be made between now and November 15, 1937. Money for which has been set aside.

Q. Has a site for the new school been selected?

A. No.

Q. How will the new site be selected?

A. Three notices of the time, place and purpose of a meeting shall be posted in three public places in the district by the clerk at least ten days prior to such meeting. A majority of the voters present at such meeting shall by vote select a site.

Q. Will the purchase of land require a new bond election?

A. No.

Q. Why is the present building obsolete?

A. Not large enough.

A. Two story frame building with the furnace located in the basement under the center of the building which constitutes a fire hazard.

Poor lighting facilities.

Inadequate toilets.

Poor ventilation which contributes to the spread of epidemic diseases.

Q. When will the bond election be held?

A. Monday, February 1, 1937, between the hours of 2 p. m. and 7 p. m. in the old grade school building.

Q. Who can vote at this bond election?

A. "Any citizen of this state, male or female, who is 21 years of age and has resided in the district thirty days immediately preceding the meeting or election and has property in the district, as shown by the last county assessment, and not assessed by the sheriff, on which he or she is liable or subject to pay a tax, shall be entitled to vote at any school meeting or election in said district; provided, that the property qualifications imposed by this section shall not apply in the election of school directors and school clerks; provided further that any person shall be deemed to have complied with the property qualification imposed by this section who presents to the directors or judges of election evidence that he has stock, shares, or ownership in any corporation, firm, or copartnership which has property in the district, as shown by the last county assessment, and not assessed by the sheriff, on which such corporation, firm, or copartnership pays a tax, even though his or her individual name does not appear upon the tax roll."
