SPRINGTIME IS CLEAN-UP TIME

You can see signs of spring fever almost everywhere. Farmers are plowing and sowing their fields. Suburbanites are planting their gardens. Housewives are cleaning and revamping homes. Communities are starting improvement projects.

Winter is apt to be a time of general neglect—partly because of severe weather and partly because of the press of other matters in that busy season. Vacant lots, yards and even streets become unsightly. Now is the time for a thorough spring cleaning, extending through the community, in the interest of health, safety and civic progress.

Such a clean-up campaign is a splendid activity for civic clubs, chambers of commerce, Boy Scouts and similar groups to sponsor. Every town should emulate those communities which, through a spirit of fine cooperation, have succeeded in gaining the name of "Spotless-town."

When a movement to paint up, clean-up and beautify sweeps a community, it leaves in its wake a healthier, happier town. From the standpoint of fire safety alone, the movement pays big dividends—as records show, many a disastrous fire has been caused by rubbish and litter. Drop a cigarette or a cigar butt into an accumulation of trash and a conflagration may follow—furthermore, piled rubbish is always susceptible to spontaneous ignition.

Carry out the clean-up campaign by carefully burning all trash in incinerators and under close supervision. Every citizen and every business will benefit—socially and economically.

NO LOTTERIES WANTED

The average citizen may not know it but there is a movement underway in this country which seeks to bring about the formation of a national lottery similar to the one operated by the Cubans and not unlike the "Irish sweepstakes" which annually takes millions of hard-earned American dollars across the sea.

The sponsors of the scheme to have the government enter the gambling business—and a lottery is a gamble if there ever was one—are not the cheap, tin-horn type of sports, as one would suppose. On the other hand some of them are highly-respected citizens. What they expect to gain is not plain, though it is safe to bet that they have a personal axe of some kind to be ground. Their argument is that people are going to gamble anyhow, and that it would be better for Uncle Sam to take their money and use it to advantage than to have foreigners grabbing it off and carrying it away where it will benefit them alone.

It's a poor argument because two wrongs never made a right. If a certain element insists on squandering its money through games of chance then setting up still another one would only encourage more people to do so. Then, too, if the government placed its stamp of approval on gambling it would wipe all gambling laws off the statute books and bring about conditions no decent American could tolerate. It is no time to corrupt the people of this country as a whole, and especially its young people, simply because a few people prefer to make fools of themselves.

"ALFALFA BILL'S" OPINION

There are not, and cannot, with safety be two Constitutions; one for "emergencies" and another for normal times. Nor can we permit the Constitution to be construed to mean that Congress and the President can do anything they believe to be for "general welfare." We may tolerate their shaving off the hair off the Constitution, but they must not take one drop of its blood. Otherwise, under a plea of "general welfare" they could stop elections for any period of time, leaving all in the office at their will.

The American people just now need to learn the lesson of the ancient Hebrew king (Kings I, Chap. 12). When Re-ho-bo-am succeeded Solomon on the throne, the people besought him to lighten the "heavy yoke" of his father. Sending them away for three days, the new king consulted with the "old men that stood before Solomon". These old men advised with wisdom to "lighten the load". The new king then consulted with the young men that had grown up with him. These young men appealed to his ambition to say to the people "My little finger shall be thicker than my father's loins. . . . My father has chastened you with whips, but I will chastise you with scorpions".

Re-ho-bo-am accepted the advice of the young men and refused the wisdom of the old. Rebellion followed, and then began the ultimate destruction of the Hebrew government founded on the wisdom of Moses and Solomon, and final slavery of her people—all because of the departure from that wisdom. Surely that must needs be a lesson to Americans—not to depart from Washington and the wise who "stood with him".

Plan 4-H Style Revues In 1500 Counties; State Queens Get Chicago Trip

County style revues again will feature the 4-H program in this state, this newspaper is advised. It is the eighth year for this popular contest, which also provides for a state revue, and a national event to be held in Chicago, December 1 as a feature of the National Club Congress.

It is estimated that 1500 counties will stage revues this year. In many states every county will hold one. The contest is open to every bona fide 4-H clothing club girl. There are no fees, and girls may procure materials and accessories for their costumes where they choose.

Contestants have a choice of one of four costumes to make and model: (1) wash dress or suit for school or sport; (2) wool dress, suit or ensemble for school sport or street wear; (3) best dress or ensemble, including dress; (4) informal dress.

The "Queen" in each county revue will be presented a handsome gold medal of honor, and the other three class winners receive gold-filled pins. All other participants will receive silver pins. The county "queen" will participate in the state revue, the winner of which receives an all-expense trip to the national revue in Chicago. A silver bracelet will be presented to each of the other three class winners.

National revue queens will each receive a 17-jewel gold watch which with all other prizes and trips are provided by the Chicago Mail Order company as sponsors. Extension agents conduct and judge all contests.

Build Sash Greenhouses

Now for Spring Sowings

With an investment of a few hundred dollars, a sash greenhouse can be constructed in time for sowing seeds for early tomatoes, eggplants and peppers, says C. H. Nissley, extension professor of vegetable gardening at the New Jersey College of Agriculture, Rutgers University.

Of the thousands of vegetable growers who have sash greenhouses, Nissley reports, there is not one who says he would be willing to go back to the old hotbed method of growing plants. It does not require much time to construct one of these buildings.

When selecting the site for a sash greenhouse, it is important to choose a well-drained location. If possible, have the greenhouse running north and south so that the inside of the house will receive the full benefit of the sunlight both morning and afternoon and the sun's rays will shine directly on the center of the house at noon. Concrete or cinder blocks used as a foundation are permanent and will last considerably longer than wood.

Reed Canary Grass

Reed canary grass is higher in feeding value than timothy hay. In a trial carried on at University farm, St. Paul, it was found that fillies made larger gains with less grain when fed canary grass than when fed prairie hay. Prairie hay is just about as good, if not a little better, than timothy hay for horses. I do not know whether canary grass would excel alsike clover hay for horses, but I think it would be almost as high in feeding value. Alsike clover might prove a little more valuable than Reed canary grass for young stock because it is a little higher in crude protein. If Reed canary grass is not too coarse, it is excellent hay for horses.—A. L. Harvey, Division of Animal Husbandry.

Bluegrass

Bulbous bluegrass, once thought practical only in regions of heavy rainfall and mild temperatures, has been found adapted to northern areas of moderate precipitation, according to a correspondent in Successful Farming. A patch has been growing for 15 years at Dickinson, North Dakota, where it has produced a good stand in dry years and has successfully resisted low winter temperatures (47 degrees below zero). It is suggested as suited for early poultry and sheep pasture and for pasture mixtures to be grazed by other livestock. It is distinguished by fleshy, bulb-like roots and also by a bulb-shaped seed pod.

Dr. O. O. Fletcher Chiropodist Gives Lasting Foot Relief

It is unwise to neglect your feet as it is to neglect any other part of the human body.

Running through the whole foot is a complicated system of nerves which convey the impulses from the brain to the foot.

This system of nerves is part of the great nervous system of the body, and a shock to any of the foot nerves is communicated to the whole nerve system so that often a foot pain causes nerve derangements in the head, the stomach, the blood system, or circulation. That's why headaches, an upset stomach, circulation of the blood ailments is frequently traceable to the feet. Today the science of the treatment of the feet has grown tremendously. A new branch of the medical profession has developed, called Chiropody, which is recognized by the highest medical boards, etc., in most states. Public Warned About Unlicensed Mail Order Insurance Companies

Salem, Ore., April 23—(Special)—Warning to those receiving pensions and other cash relief. State Insurance Commissioner Hugh H. Earle has received information that many unlicensed mail order insurance companies, societies, benefit associations etc., are trying to secure a list of the names of all those receiving pensions and cash relief, with the idea of selling them worthless insurance. Commissioner Earle desires to warn these people, as well as all other citizens, not to purchase insurance through the mail or from advertisements until they are sure that the organization is licensed to transact business in this state.

Even if these unauthorized organizations were solvent in case where a claim was in dispute, it would be necessary for an Oregon citizen to bring suit in the state where the organization is located. The cost of such suit, if successful would in most cases exceed the amount of the claim.

If there is any doubt in a person's mind as to whether a company is licensed in this state, he should write to the State Insurance Dept. at Salem, Oregon.
