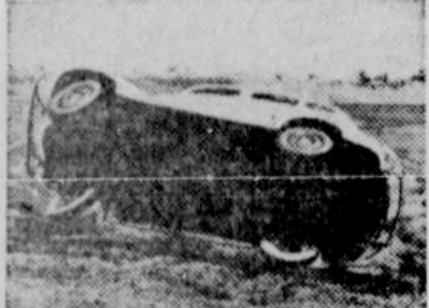


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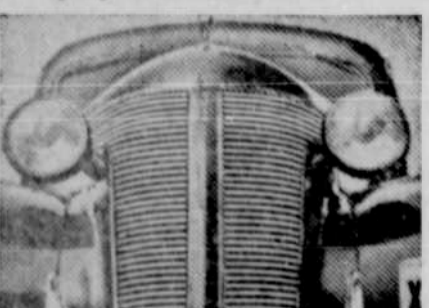

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Thirty-six Warships to Visit Portland Harbor

Portland, Oregon, Friday May 21—Special—Portland invites the entire west to the mobilization in Portland harbor July 18 to 29 of the United States Fleet. Thirty-six warships with 15,000 officers and men and a squadron of 50 giant planes will move into the harbor for two weeks liberty immediately following the war maneuvers in the Pacific.

Portland is arranging a gala celebration. The city will take on a carnival spirit with streets decorated, special outdoor shows dances and entertainment throughout the period and with the largest naval parade ever attempted on the Pacific Coast. The ships including all heavy cruisers, will be anchored at the docks in the heart of the city and will be open for public inspection. The navy plans various demonstrations including air circus events and night illumination by warships.

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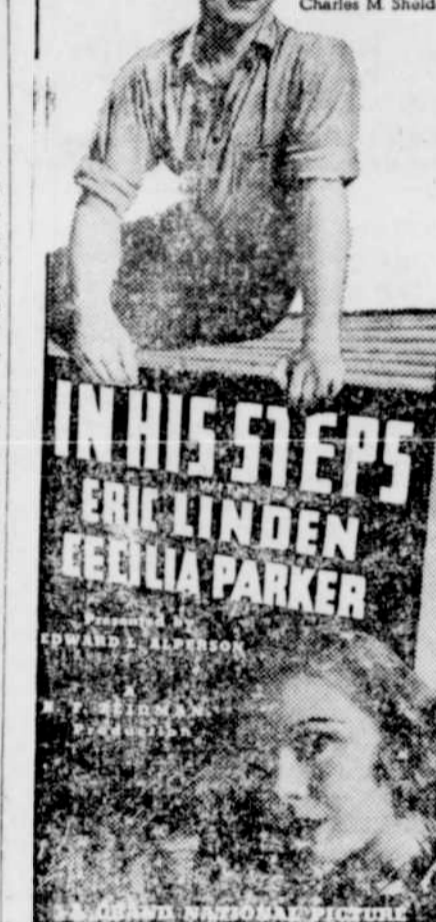
