A. B. Clements and G. Lyle were fishing at East Lake over the week end bringing back the limit.

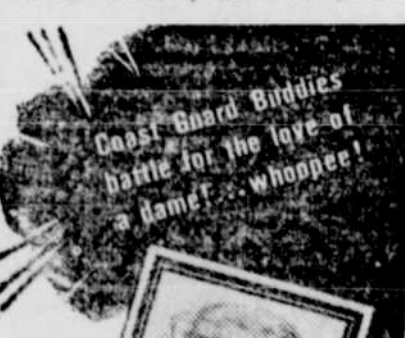
