Hear Court Case
Judge Earl Latourette of Clackamas county has been assigned to try the case of Mark Skinner, Superintendent of Banks against John W. Bailey and other stockholders of the Shute Bank in Liquidation; the appointment was made by Chief Justice Bean of the State Supreme Court.

Clearing of Valley Streams Planned

Meetings to perfect improvement districts for channel clearings and realignments along three Washington county streams are planned, according to a published report of a cos. survey by United States army engineers covering all phases of the program has been announced by leaders of the Washington County planning board.

The project includes straightening and channel clearing along West Dairy Creek to include also the east fork of that stream and the Tualatin from Gaston to near Forest Grove.

Property owners on West Dairy from Manning three miles above Banks to the junction of the forks have signed agreements, permitting entry to their land and enrolling in the improvement district, now in final stages of formation according to the county planning board.

Financing will be made available from an \$800,000 appropriation for the entire Tualatin river already approved by the United States army engineers with the provision that this area comply with such regulations as organization of districts and agreements to maintain the improvement.

Vote to be Taken for District Consolidation

The Washington county boundary board has called an election for August 9 of school patrons in the Deerlick and Scoggins districts on a proposal to merge the former district with that of Scoggins, according to O. B. Kraus, county superintendent.

In view of the fact that several transient families have moved from Deerlick, leaving no directors nor clerk the election there will be conducted by the county superintendent. Both districts must vote favorably to effect a consolidation and the merger would more than double the assessed valuation on the Scoggins district according to the official.
