In convention the legion delegates do not ponder political and partisan issues but voted on matters of far greater national import. They voted to ask Congress for an investigation and deportation of those alien "ism" groups and they reaffirmed their faith in the Bill of Rights as a living document designed for the protection of the humblest citizen.

This community is fortunate to have among its citizens a number of these true Americans—the Legionnaires. However, it is regrettable that the legion's gigantic parade up Fifth avenue could not have been made the entire length of the Lincoln Highway. Reliefers Work Less And Get More

WPA Survey Reveals 25 Per Cent Increase in Hourly Relief Wages

WASHINGTON (IPS)—The average "reliever" on the government's WPA payroll now earns \$7.42 more per month and works ten hours less at pick-axe welding, card-cataloging, shoveling folk-song collecting etc than when the Works Progress Administration was established less than two years ago, a survey by that agency reveals.

From January 1936 to June 1937, the average hourly wage for the workers rose nearly 25 percent.

For example, the WPA reports that New York City reliefers are now doing 108.04 hours of work per month for an hourly wage of 74.7 cents. This hourly wage equals many of the building trades wages in most cities.

When the WPA was operating with a peak number on its payroll, the average worker throughout the U. S. put in 111.3 hours per month for 40.9 cents per hour. Today he works 101.58 hours monthly and receives 82.1 cents an hour. The exact increase in wages, therefore is 24.98 percent, while the decrease in hours worked for this pay represents 8.73 percent.

Buying a Living

The average family in the United States having a small income spends more on food than for other purposes. The family car is a close second.

On the Pacific coast the government statistics show the spending records of our people in all occupational groups who have incomes from \$3,999 a year on down to \$750 a year. The automobile appeared to be almost the only means of transportation for them. Eighty-eight out of every 100 of these families spend less than 50 cents a month for traveling expenses outside their own cars.

In 33 villages of North and South Carolina, Georgia and Mississippi the automobile outlay was smaller than for food, about fourth on the list. The study of native whites throughout the country shows that in "buying their living" they require \$139 to \$194 a year for the "family car."

In Oregon and Washington more than one-half of all the families own their own homes and their own automobiles. Thrifty folks out west!

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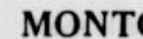
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
