Trap Nesting Topic Of Poultry Meeting

The fact that trap nesting is not
entirely essential to the carrying out
of a good poultry brooding program
was pointed out by Noel Bennion,
Extension Poultryman, in his discus-
sion of "Breeding for Better Egg
Production" at the opening meeting
of the monthly poultry meeting se-
ries which was held at the Beaverton
Grange Hall Tuesday, October 12.
reports L. E. Francis, assistant coun-
ty agent. Sixty Washington county
poultrymen were present at the din-
ner and meeting.

Egg production, pointed out Ben-
nion, is governed by five hereditary
characteristics namely: persistency
of production, which is the length
the laying period; intensity of pro-
duction, or rate of lay; age of sexual
maturity, which is the time when the
first egg is laid; winter pause;
and broodiness. Eighty per cent of
the variation in egg production is
governed by the first three factors.

The average hatcheryman and
poultry breeder who is not estab-
lished on a large enough scale to
warrant trap nesting can go over his
flock four or five times a year and
select the birds showing the various
traits and leg band them with dif-
ferent colored leg bands.

Mr. Bennion further explained this
method by pointing out that in the
case of a flock of white leghorns, the
birds can be examined when they are
from 150 to 180 days of age and
those that have reached sexual ma-
turity can be banded with a white
band. After about two months in
production the flock can be again
examined for intensity of production
and those birds showing that char-
acteristic can be banded with a red
band. During winter months the
birds can be watched for signs of
winter pause and those birds banded
with a black band. The following
spring any broody birds can be banded
with green bands and in the late
summer the flock can be gone over
once more to determine the birds
that show persistency of production
and these birds can be banded with
blue bands.

It can now be seen stated Bennion
that the birds which will be desirable
as producers from the standpoint of
egg production will be those birds
wearing the leg bands for early ma-
turity, intensity of production and
persistency of production or, in other
words, red, white and blue bands.
Those birds wearing either green or
black bands, or both, are probably an
undesirable type and can be culled
out of the breeding flock.

At first thought, mentioned Ben-
nion, a poultryman is apt to feel
that such a program is complicated
and will require unnecessary effort.
However, without a trap nesting
record it is the only complete satis-
factory method whereby a progres-
sive production breeding program can
be carried out.

In conclusion to his discussion
Bennion pointed out that now is the
time to have the breeding flock
going out of production so that the
birds will be able to have a good
rest and resume production in time
for the hatching season. It is usually
necessary to remove the lights and
possibly remove mash for a few days
in order to slow down production.

Mr. Bennion did caution, however,
that it is not desirable to throw the
birds into molt in order to get them
out of production but rather to cause
production to taper off so that the
birds will go into a molt gradually.
After the rest period is past and
the birds are to be brought back into
production it is advisable, especially
in the case of the breeders to pro-

vide plenty of well-balanced feed,
using a breeding mash containing
plenty of Vitamin D and to make
liberal use of green feed. The
breeder mash should, by all means,
be fed to the flock considerably
ahead of the hatching season rather
than to wait until the hatching eggs
are to be gathered.

Spiked Boots Ban Saved

Traverse City Sidewalks
His boots were as sacred to a lum-
berjack in Michigan's boom timber
era as a saddle to a cowboy, but
the loggers couldn't wear them in
Traverse City, reveals a Traverse
City correspondent in the Detroit
Free Press.

The city passed an ordinance pro-
viding a maximum fine of \$10 or
10 days in jail for the lumberman
who was found wearing spiked boots
in the city limits. In the '80s and the
'90s, there was a good reason for
the rule. Traverse City sidewalks
then were constructed of wood.

After a couple of instances when
the city had laid a sidewalk of
new white pine and three or four
hundred rivermen had come off a
drive and riddled it with their spiked
boots the city decided to call a halt.

The boots, made of the finest kan-
garoo skin and costing as much as
\$45 a pair, were purchased in the
fall. Through the winter the loggers
tramped them carefully with mutton
tallow, but they never wore them
until spring when the drive started.
Then the boots went on and stayed
on for as long as two months.

Why the loggers insisted on wa-
terproof boots when they spent most
of the working day waist-deep in the
water hasn't been explained.

Oregon's Auto Deaths

A Series of Weekly Articles on the
Problem of Highway Safety

The Chicago fire of sixty-five years
ago has come down in history as one
of the greatest of national disasters.
Few people realize that more people
were killed in traffic accidents in
Oregon during the last three months
of 1936 than met death in this his-
toric catastrophe. A horrified na-
tion years ago was shocked to hear
that 107 had fallen victims to the
flames; yet day after day last year
the record of traffic accidents rolled
up, practically unnoticed until a total
of 133 was reached.

This is a daily average of approx-
imately one and one half fatalities
every four hours, on the streets and
highways of our own state.

The seriousness of the situation
must be brought home to every driv-
er of a motor car. The newspa-
pers of Oregon are cooperating with
my department in a manner that is
highly appreciated to bring this
about; the high schools of the state
are actively working on a solution
of the problem; enforcement agen-
cies are devoting more and more
time to traffic; and the state-wide
program of organization in the var-
ious communities is well under way,
under my direction.

The problem is so big, the need
for its correction so great that no
effort is too great to put forth for
its solution. I am very hopeful that
October, November and December of
this year will show a record that
will be much better than last year's,
and ask cooperation of all in a
determined effort to reduce Oregon's
traffic deaths.
