And until human nature has been completely legislated out of existence there will be no "strike of capital" so long as that capital is given the opportunity to flow into legitimate investment.

Apostolic Faith to Hold Special Holiday Services

Extensive preparations have been made by the Apostolic Faith, NW Sixth and Burnside Streets for the special Holiday meetings which are to be held between Christmas and New Year's. Numerous delegations will be in attendance from the various branches of the work scattered up and down the Pacific Coast.

The convocation will continue throughout the Holiday Season, including afternoon and evening services. The afternoon services will be devoted to Bible talks, and the evening meetings entirely evangelistic.

It will be of special interest to music lovers to know that on Christmas Eve, beginning at 7:30 the entire evening will be devoted to an elaborate program of music arranged by Reverend R. R. Crawford, General Overseer. The 50-piece Concert Orchestra, Wurlitzer Organ and Grand Chorus of 125 voices will give their interpretation of Christmas music.

The Orchestra will open the program with Theodore M. Tobani's arrangement of Christmas hymns and carols, "Around the Christmas Tree." This will be followed by "The Heavens Are Telling," from Haydn's Oratorio, "The Creation." The Grand chorus will then present a specially arranged Cantata, "Sing, O Heavens," from the works of various composers, built around the Christmas story. In this is featured one of the old French Noels sung a capella style by thirty-two voices.

Throughout Christmas week there will be presentation of special music by the various vocal and musical organizations, at each of the services. The regular broadcast of Chapel Moments at 9 o'clock on Wednesday night, over KWWJ will be continued. The entire service on Sunday afternoon from 2:30 to 3:30 is released over the air from this station.

A watch night service will be held New Year's Eve from 7:45 clear thru to 12 midnight. This service is in the nature of an "open house," giving all the leaders of the various departments of the work an opportunity to report on their activities. These interesting talks are interspersed with music by the various musical and singing organizations. The entire congregation goes to prayer a few minutes before 12 o'clock to pray out the old year and in the new.

The services are as follows: Christmas Day 2:30 and 7:45; Sunday, 10:30 2:30 and 7:30; and every day through Christmas Week at 2:30 and 7:45.

The public is invited and no collections are ever taken.

wages thus boosting manufacturing costs. Shoq imports increase because Czechoslovakian shoes can now undersell ours. American shoe makers secure an increase in shoe tariffs. Czechoslovakia retaliates by shifting her American cotton purchases to another nation. The net results for us: Higher taxes, lower cotton income, increased retail prices less factory production, smaller payrolls. Thus, the vicious circle goes on. Each group wants the government to protect it or to guarantee it against losses.

If the American standard of living is to continue upward, we must make some sacrifices. Our standard of living is actually tending downward right now. We are constantly boosting our production costs. So long as the output of our workers increased faster than our costs, we were safe. Today, the magical efficiency of new machines is no longer able to close up the gap of shorter hours, higher pay, and bigger taxes! The unit output of each worker began to slide in early

1937. This means the standard of living has started down-hill. To turn it upward again, world production must be stimulated by fostering foreign trade.

Aid to Many Products

Unraveling the snarls built up over the past forty years is an almost super-human task. Yet, in spite of tremendous pressure from American as well as foreign interests, Secretary Hull has negotiated sixteen reciprocal trade agreements. He has had to fight with every American industry to take a little reduction; but for each reduction he has received a good concession from some foreign power. The net result has been a big growth in the mutual trade of these nations with an accompanying increase in living standards.

For instance, Canada, an important buyer of wheat and automobiles, granted a 60 per cent tariff reduction on the former and from 12 to 25 per cent on the latter. France purchases a generous percentage of our office equipment and has granted a 25 per cent tariff reduction on some of these items. The following figures give further evidence of the satisfactory results of a reciprocal pact:—Exports to treaty nations in 1934—up to 22.2 per cent; to others up to 11.3 per cent. In 1935 they gained 14.1 and 4 per cent respectively. Imports in 1934 from treaty nations—up 46.8 per cent and from others up 45.7 per cent. In 1935 imports gained 21.9 and 15.6 per cent respectively.

Because of their great work in this respect, President Roosevelt and Secretary Hull should be nominated for the Nobel Peace Prize!
