Albany College Spring Semester Opens Feb. 7

Spring semester of college work opens in Albany college at Portland and at Albany, February 7. New courses of special interest to students enrolling for this second semester have been added in both institutions, according to Dr. Thomas W. Bibb, president.

In Portland students may register in courses that are preliminary to whatever degrees they wish to obtain. For instance, they make work off freshman English requirements and lay the foundations of Psychology. Through an arrangement with Behnke-Walker business college, freshmen may take typewriting and shorthand at the same time they are acquiring liberal arts credits applicable toward future degrees.

Courses offered in Albany college at Portland in which students may register January 24 to February 7 include English, Bible, History, Geographic and Historical Background of Industry, International Relations, Psychology, Sociology, Public Speaking, Drama, French or German, Music, Art, Typing, Shorthand, Trigonometry and Chemistry.

Here in Portland, Albany college gives courses in physical education, with competing teams in several sports, such as basketball, track, and swimming. Registration includes tickets to Ellison-White concert series, textbooks, and all fees. Scholarships are offered in music and may be given in voice, piano, or violin after applicants have had auditions with Miss Stella G. Fraser, head of the school of music in Albany college at Portland.

Dr. Bibb announced that two honor scholarships to the campus at Albany will be given to each high school in Portland and outlying territories. Students enrolling in Albany college at Albany may select courses from the following fields: English, Public speaking, Dramatics, Journalism, Biblical Literature, Mathematics, Botany, Introduction to Physical Science, Modern History, Sociology, Psychology, Typing, Shorthand, Physical Education, and Music. New students with advanced standing from other colleges or universities may also take courses in Education, Shakespeare, Oregon History, Philosophy and International Law.

Spring on the Albany college campus is one of the most vivifying of the year. For those interested in music, the Easter Cantata is an inspiring event. The annual Biology trip to Newport where students may spend a week-end on the beach, gathering specimens and samples of marine life is one of this semester's highlights. Following it comes May day with a senior girl elected to reign over the entire campus, conducting her court under the spreading arms of a giant elm.

Rural Unemployed may Register in County

Salem, Oregon, Friday, January 7—The State Employment Service this week announced an itinerant service to enable eligible unemployed workers in small towns and rural districts to register for employment and file their claims for unemployment benefits at points near their homes.

This service will consist of a weekly visit by representatives of the State Employment Service to more than 50 towns of the State and will be continued for such time as local employment conditions seem to require.

Each person applying for unemployment benefits is required to register with the Employment Service for a job. If he has worked at an employment subject to the State Unemployment Compensation law and is found eligible for benefits, he may draw compensation after a waiting period of two weeks providing suitable employment is not found for him in the meantime. Traffic Quizes For You and Me

Am I ever permitted to pass another Car on the Right?

In a highway of four or more lanes, you may pass another vehicle on the right if you do not exceed the indicated speed in doing so. You may also pass to the right of a vehicle making a left turn.

What should I do upon the approach of a fire engine or ambulance? You should drive at once to the right hand edge of the street or highway, clear of any intersection, and stop. You should remain there until the vehicle has passed or until instructed to move by police officers.

Betsy Ross' Name
Ross was Betsy Ross' maiden name, says the Philadelphia Inquirer. She was the daughter of Samuel and Rebecca Ross. In 1772 she eloped to Gloucester, N. J., with John Ross, an upholsterer, and there married him. It was as the widow of Ross that she achieved fame by her reputed making of the first American flag. In 1777 she married Capt. Joseph Ashburne at Old Swedes church. Ashburne was captured by the British and died in Old Mill prison, Plymouth, England. In 1783 she married John Claypoole.

Historic Reminders in Lima
In Lima, Peruvian capital dating from the early Spanish days of the Fifteenth century, are notable monuments reminiscent of the viceroys, the University of San Marcos, the oldest seat of learning in the Western hemisphere, and the finest examples of Spanish colonial architecture in existence. Adjacent to modern Lima are the ancient shrines of the pre-conquest peoples and the dead city of Coeval, which vies with Babylon in its antiquity.—Rocky Mountain Herald.

Old Autographs in Cave

Practically all of the exploring of Mammoth cave, Kentucky, before the Civil war was done by the use of reed torches and home made tallow candles. In those days it was a practice of the visitors who were taking routes through the cave to tie their candles on walking canes and smoke their names on the walls and ceiling of the cave. At one place in the cave this practice was carried on so extensively that it has been named Register hall. Here many of the dates are a century or a quarter old.
