Today's Taxogram

The six cents tax collected by government last year on every package of cigarettes sold, took an estimated \$575,000,000 out of the pockets of Americans during 1937, internal revenue figures indicate. Thus, an average American man who smokes a package of cigarettes each day, contribute \$21.90 in this form of indirect taxation—six cents a day hidden in the price of a purchased article.
